be of unseating the Deacons this spring, McLeod and his golfers are currently using the fall portion of the 1975-76 season to prepare for a run at number one. Today and Saturday they are in Greenville, S.C., participating in the Furman Invitational Golf Tournament.

The tournament has a unique format with six players from each school divided into three two-man teams, each team playing best-ball. Two teams compete for the team title while the third tries for the individual crown.

McLeod has a youthful lineup of three sophomores, two freshman, and one senior for this tournament.

The parings for the two-man teams are senior Mark Bope and sophomore Wes Minton; freshmen Kevin King and Bryan Beymer, and sophomores Mark Hellffrich and Freddie Palmer. None were among the players who participated in the Dixie Intercollegiate Tournament in Pine Mountain, Ga., two weeks ago, where the Heels finished fourth before a disgualification pushed them back to 11th. "I want everyone to have a chance to play under tournament conditions," says McLeod. "We need to find out who can play and who can't. That's what golf is all about - determining who is best for spring. Spring

### Harriers face Clemson in only '75 home meet

North Carolina will host Clemson in the only home cross country encounter of the season Saturday at 11:00 a.m. Carolina's third meet of the season comes on the heels of last week's disappointing loss to Maryland on the Terps' home course. In that race the Tar Heels were swamped by Maryland's tightly knit pack of runners, as the home squad swept the second through eighth positions while Carolina's Ralph King took first.

UNC's Tommy Ward, who finished 14th in last week's race, analyzed the team's weak showing. "They (Maryland) took off real fast and everybody was psyched out," he said. "We thought we'd burn ourselves out going out that fast so we didn't go out full pace. We thought they'd come back to us but we shoulda' stayed with them." Ward added that the Terps' method of picking up and slowing down the pace on their home course helped them dominate the meet. "They won't blow us out like that again," he confidently

they just didn't compete," he said, noting the fact that the Tar Heel team captain missed the trip to College Park. "They weren't even in the race after the first mile and a half. I jumped on them pretty hard, and this has been a tough week in terms of workouts. I'm looking for them to run a good race against Clemson because they know they didn't compete against Maryland. 




