

Netters demolish ECU minus four top players

The UNC's women's tennis team upped their record to 5-1 Wednesday, white washing East Carolina 9-0 in Chapel Hill. The Tar Heels dominated the match, leading the overall game score 108-12. It was the 31st win for Carolina in the last 33 matches, 15 of which have been shutouts. UNC was without four of its top five players against the Pirates. Camey Timberlake, Susie Black, Jane Preyer and Nina Cloaninger were unable to participate in Wednesday's match. The Tar Heels will travel to Williamsburg, Va. Friday to take on William and Mary. Carolina will then have a week off before a

'Pack' of question marks

RALEIGH—North Carolina State freshman Mary Yohe arrived outside Reynolds Coliseum at 2 a.m. She estimates about 200 people were already there. They waited in line for a ticket to the N.C. State-UNC football game.

At 8:30 a.m. the Coliseum ticket office opened. At 9:30, after a sleepless night, Yohe got a ticket. That's all that mattered.

Saturday is the game. Over 50,000 spectators are expected for the 75 edition of the long-standing rivalry between Carolina and State which have been meeting on the football field ever since 1893 and are located within 30 miles of each other.

N.C. State Head Coach Lou Holtz, who brings a winless conference team into the contest, said at his weekly press conference, "I'm shell-shocked. I don't mind telling you. I don't know if we can slow them (Carolina) down, and I don't know if we can move the ball consistently over a series of drives."

"Our offense has been pretty good, but the defense has been up and down," said Holtz. "We're going to have to get bigger, stronger and meaner if we hope to slow them down."

Last weekend the Wolfpack fell to Maryland 37-22. They committed costly

turnovers, despite rolling up 375 yards on offense. Overall, they are 0-2 in the Atlantic Coast Conference, with a 30-22 loss to Wake Forest and are 3-3 against all competition.

"I have never gone into a football game with as many question marks about what we can do positively," Holtz said.

He singled out UNC quarterback Billy Paschall, who made his varsity debut two years ago at Carter Stadium, "I don't know of any quarterback who has done a better job against us over here."

In general against Carolina, Holtz said his team doesn't always play intelligently. "The

only chance we have is to have a very very good intelligent football game."

"I don't believe in the emotion from one year to the next," said Holtz, whose Pack took a 33-14 defeat in Chapel Hill last year.

"We'll play 10 freshmen. They think they know what it's all about, but they really don't. The seniors do."

Though Holtz may hope his pessimism psychs State, a main attitude toward this game belongs to Yohe.

"I really hope we win. My best friend goes to Carolina."

Clemson bags booters abroad

Clemson's soccer coach, Ibrahim M. Ibrahim, may depart on another safari this year. If so, it will be in hopes of luring more Tigers to his team. In the past his hunt for talent has covered Africa, South America, and the West Indies to assemble a number one ranked soccer team. Of his 22 athletes, only two were recruited from the United States. Perhaps if Clemson reaches the NCAA soccer championship, they might be faced with one more problem: How to teach the players to sing the National Anthem in English.

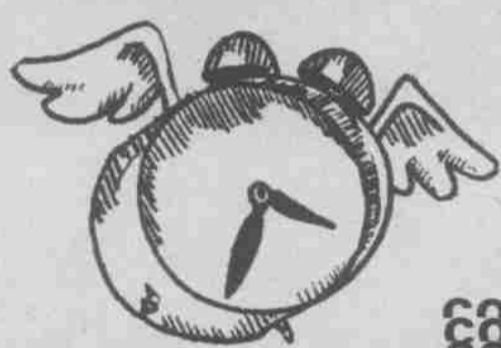

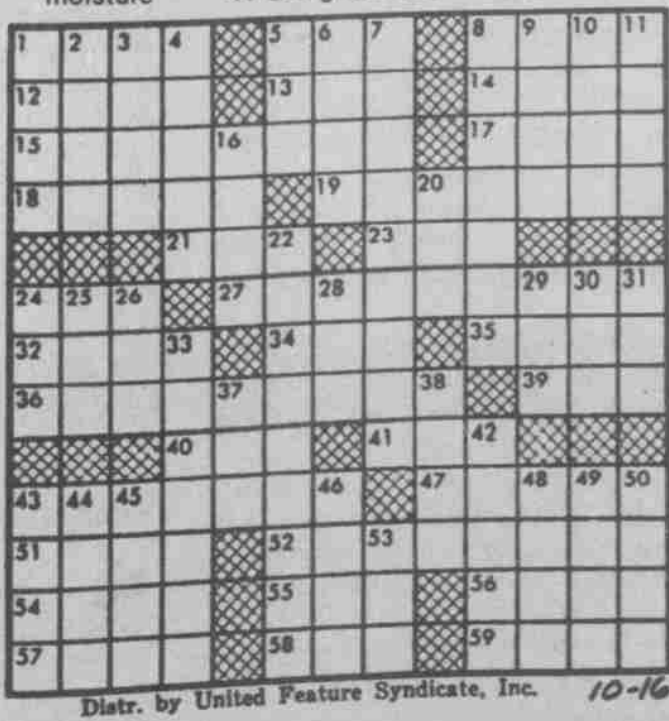
