Meeting on gay counseling held here

Approximately 120 people attended a regional conference on homosexuality counseling here this past weekend. Carolina Gay Association President Don Chauncey said Sunday.

The conference was co-sponsored by two UNC student organizations, CGA and the Human Sexuality Information and Counseling Service.

Chauncey said the purpose of the conference was to familiarize people who counsel gays with the resources available to them, discuss the concept of homosexuality and counseling in a positive manner and exchange ideas between gays and straights. "So much literature is cure-oriented,"

Chauncey said. "There was no attempt to discuss curing gayness. Attempts were made to make gays aware of their choices."

The keynote speaker for the conference was Ralph Blair, one-time personal counselor at the City College of New York.

Blair established New York's Homosexual Community Counseling Center, which coordinated the conference.

Chauncey said Blair noted that no one has ever been cured of homosexuality and that the primary concern of gays should be self-awareness.

Following Blair's speech, a panel discussed various problems and concerns confronting gays, such as those which lesbians, gay men, professionals who counsel gays and gays in prison encounter from

straights.

The conference then broke up into small workshops to exchange ideas on homosexuality. Chauncey said topics of the individual workshops included coming out, lesbianism, gay-straight relationships and religion.

Chauncey said he felt the conference was successful because "it was the first time many people who work with or counsel gays were present at a conference which dealt with gayness in a positive manner."

Over half the delegates attending were from North Carolina, and some were from as far away as Atlanta, Chauncey said.

CGA will host a regional conference of gay awareness groups here in April, Chauncey said.

House Committee urges ban of all lie detectors

WASHINGTON — A House committee urged the government Sunday to ban polygraph and other lie detector devices for all purposes, saying they not only abuse rights, privacy and dignity, but they are useless.

"If the federal agencies are not willing to

follow our recommendation, it might be necessary to forbid the practice by legislation," said Rep. Bella Abzug, D-N.Y., chairperson of a government operations subcommittee which wrote the report.

The report said it heard from organizations complaining that lie detectors

violate constitutional rights against self-incrimination. Some also said refusal to take a test often is construed as evidence of guilt itself.

Thirteen of the 14 Republicans on the 43-member committee dissented from the report. They said some uses should be retained.

Guerrillas attack Beirut papers

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Syria tightened its control over Lebanon's cease-fire Sunday in the wake of a Palestinian guerrilla attack on the offices of two leftist Beirut newspapers in which seven persons, one of them a senior editor, were killed.

The country was calm following Saturday night's attack by Syrian-backed Saïqa guerrillas on the offices of the newspapers Moharrer and Beirut, the first major violation of the 11-day-old truce.

Syrian Foreign Minister Abdel Halim Khaddam told Lebanese leftist leaders Saturday night that broad agreement has been reached on political issues.

HEW meeting rescheduled

A scheduled presentation of the consolidated university's semi-annual desegregation report to the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare Friday was postponed until at least today.

Cleon Thompson, UNC acting vice president for civil services, said Sunday that HEW called off the meeting, saying that other work had to be completed first.

He said that HEW would contact him this morning to set up another meeting, which he said could be as soon as this afternoon.

Thompson will be accompanied on the trip by Charles R. Coble, associate vice president for planning.

HEW and the University had scheduled the meeting last week so that UNC officials could present their semi-annual progress report on desegregation and answer any questions the agency might have on the UNC desegregation plan.

The plan will be presented to Martin Gerry, acting director of HEW's Office of Civil Rights.
