Taylor breaks steeplechase school record

For Carolina trackman Kent Taylor, the spring season provides a challenge that he can't get from cross country running in the fall or the indoor track in the winter: the 3000-meter steeplechase. This curiosity, originally devised for horses, breaks the monotony of flat racing, and contains an extra dimension of excitement and drama rarely matched in ordinary athletics.

Three thousand meters, a distance not quite two miles, is seven and a half times around the track. Each lap holds five obstacles—waist high wooden barriers that can be stepped or jumped over, one of which has a small body of water lying behind. Only a mammoth leap from the top of the barrier can clear this water, which is about three feet at its deepest.

It is in this event, actively avoided by most distance runners, that Taylor excels. A week ago he set the UNC record in the steeple with a 9:01 clocking at the University of Richmond. Saturday he bettered that and set a meet record by beating a strong field at the State Record Relays in Columbia, S.C., in

Two other Carolina athletes won events Saturday. Dave Robinson cleared 15 feet to take the pole vault, and Ralph King outdistanced the field in the 1500 meters, running 3:46.9.

In addition, the Heels placed Dennis Quick second in the long jump, Jeff Gorski third in the javelin, Will Southerland and Don Lockerbie fourth and fifth in the 800, Chris Cox and Chip Wilson fifth and sixth in the intermediate hurdles, Dave Hamilton fourth in the 500 meters and Spencer Wynne sixth in the triple jump.

Carolina placed fifth in the 10-team meet, behind Auburn, host South Carolina, and ACC rivals N.C. State and Clemson.

Taylor's steeple time missed the national qualifying mark by one second, a second he plans to make up at the Carolina Relays here Saturday. From there, he should go into the ACC meet April 17 as the favorite to win the steeple. His goal for the season is to break

And despite the obvious punishment the legs take from steepling, Taylor wants to run the event every week. "I'm hot," he said.

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Women stun Duke; men dealt 2nd loss

After falling twice to the Duke Blue Devils in the fall, the UNC women's tennis team dominated last Thursday's match and ripped its old nemesis 7-1 on the Duke courts. The victory, UNC's fourth in as many

outings this spring, was highlighted by Jane Preyer's stunning upset of Duke's Cindy Johnson in No. 1 singles. Preyer needed a tie-breaker to win the first'

set 7-6. She took charge in the second, notching a 6-4 victory to win the match. "She had kind of an off day and I played well," said Preyer, only the second UNC player to defeat Johnson.

Susie Black, playing No. 2, had an even closer match, however. She split her first two sets and won a tie-breaker in the third to defeat Patty Mays.

Camey Timberlake, Nina Cloaninger and Rebecca Garcia all had easy times as Carolina clinched the match after the singles competition. Duke's Erin Wolf provided the Blue Devils' only consolation by defeating UNC's Suzanne Bowron.

The Tar Heels are idle until Thursday when they compete in the Southern Collegiate Tournament in Columbus, Miss.

The UNC men's tennis team suffered only its second loss of the season Saturday, dropping a 5-4 decision to nationally ninthranked Princeton in Princeton, N.J. The loss left Carolina with a 15-2 record going into an important match against Maryland Monday in College Park.

Carolina's women fencers finished their season Saturday by placing 25th in the national tournament in Montclair, N. J. In only its second season, the women's team compiled a 13-1 dual meet record,

The UNC women's golf team finished eighth in the Lady Paladin Tournament last weekend at Furman University. The twentyteam field was led by Tulsa which upset Furman, the defending champion.

The Tar Heels gained a 3-3 split in singles but lost two of the three doubles contests, all of which went three sets. UNC's Billy Brock racked up his 16th win of the year against one loss by defeating Bill Dutton on the No. court, 6-3, 6-2. Princeton's Bob Fisher knocked off Tommy Dixon on court No. 2,

6-3, 6-4, and UNC's Earl Hassler beat Edwardo Gentile, 7-5, 6-2 on court three. Carolina's David Oberstein lost his first singles match of the season after running off 15 straight, losing to John Hayes on court

No. 4, 6-0, 6-4. Princeton's Gross downed

Junie Chatman on court No. 5, 6-2, 6-3, and Carolina's Cliff Skakle had to go three sets to beat Brightfield, 6-3, 2-6, 6-4 on court six.

After Fisher polished off Dixon in singles he teamed with Dutton to defeat Brock-Dixon on the first doubles court, 4-6, 6-2, 6-3. The doubles team of Hassler-Oberstein lost its first match this year, 5-7, 6-3, 7-6 to Brightfield-Gross. The UNC duo is now 15-1. That loss put the match out of reach despite Chatman and Skakle's win in the third doubles contest, 6-2, 1-6, 6-3 over Hayes-Kraksra.

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
