Scott: ERA's chances good

Jessie Rae Scott, who ran unsuccessfully for the North Carolina Labor's Commissioner post in 1976, said Tuesday that the "Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) has its best chance for ratification in this year's general assembly."

Scott and her husband, former Gov. Robert W. Scott, were named honorary cochairpersons of a new board of advisors to the North Carolinians United for ERA (NCUERA) at a news conference by the NCUERA at the Hilton Inn in Raleigh.

Other North Carolinians named to the 29 person advisory board are Duke University President and former Gov. Terry Sanford, Duke University Vice-President and Secretary-designate to the U.S. Department of Commerce Juanita Kreps, Kenan Professor of Law and former UNC Chancellor Dr. William B. Aycock, Secretary of the Department of Natural and Economic Resources and former Chapel Hill

Mayor Howard Lee and publisher Orville Campbell of the Chapel Hill Newspaper.

The announcement of the NCUERA's new board of advisors came on the eve of the 1977 session of the general assembly, in which ERA backers hope to see the amendment ratified. Ratification of the amendment was narrowly defeated in both the 1973 and the 1975 sessions of the general assembly.

Sallie Shuping, chairperson of the Association for Women Students (AWS) at UNC attended the press conference and was told by the Rev. Mrs. Maria Bliss, NCUERA president, that UNC is "the only campus that has really been a help" in the ratification effort. AWS is one of 32 state organizations represented in NCUERA.

The Equal Rights Amendment was approved by the U.S. Congress in 1972 and has been ratified by 34 state legislatures. It must be ratified by four more states to become law.

UNC to receive \$11-million Pogue endowment

An \$11-million gift of the late Dr. and Mrs. Joseph E. Pogue has been added to the University's Endowment Fund. The gift is the largest in UNC history.

Chancellor N. Ferebee Taylor presented the gift at the Dec. 10 meeting of the UNC Board of Trustees.

The gift, designated by the Trustees to be the Pogue Fund, will be used as part of the University development program, library acquisitions, support for the University Research Council, faculty research and study projects, fellowships, scholarships and a special opportunity fund.

A \$225,000 portion of the fund will be spent during this fiscal year. The Trustees authorized an expenditure of \$600,000 during the fiscal year ending in 1978.

Pogue was a retired vice president of the Chase Manhattan Bank of New York when he died in 1971. His wife died in 1973, after naming the University as the main beneficiary of her estate and recipient of assets from trusts created by Pogue.

The process of settling the estate forced the University to wait four years to receive the \$11 million. The Chase Manhattan Bank was responsible for settling the estate and distributing the assets.

Pogue was a Raleigh native. He graduated with

a chemistry degree from the University in 1906 and a masters degree in 1907. He also received a Ph.D. in geology from Yale University two years later.

While he was an undergraduate at the University, Pogue was inducted into Phi Beta Kappa honor society in his junior year.

He received the Southerland Fellowship in Chemistry for one year of graduate study. After earning his masters degree, Pogue was awarded the Kerr Prize in Geology and Mineralogy for his thesis containing original work on North Carolina geology and mineralogy.

In 1963 the University awarded him the Doctor of Science degree.

Pogue's wife was not a graduate of the University, but she continued to make donations to the school after her husband's death.

After graduating from the University, Pogue became assistant curator in the Division of Mineralogy and Petrology at the Smithsonian Institution until 1913. He then became an associate geologist for the U.S. Geological Survey and later a faculty member at Northwestern University as an associate professor.

Pogue returned to the Smithsonian Institution in 1917, and in 1918 he became assistant director of the Bureau of Oil Conservation, U.S. Fuel Administration, through the end of World War I.

Pogue was a member of the General Alumni Association and a regular contributor to funds, including the Rare Book Room and special collections of the Wilson Library, the Institute of Natural Science, the geology department, the Alumni Annual Giving Fund and the Chancellor's discretionary fund.

The Pogues had no children and lived in Lake Wales, Fla., until they died.

Bus alterations to take place

Although the S and U bus routes, the main campus routes, will remain unchanged, several other route adjustments will become effective Jan. 29 in an effort by the Transportation Advisory Board (TAB) to improve local bus service.

The adjustments, recommended by Staff Consultant John Pappas, include eliminating the A route, returning the G bus to Colonial Heights and returning the F bus to West Franklin Street.

The L bus will be rerouted by Airport Road to make up for the elimination of the A bus. Also, the N route will be eliminated after 9 p.m. and the K park-ride service will also be decreased.

Pappas had also proposed the elimination of the S route, which serves South Campus. However, the University, which maintains contracts with the town with regard to the campus bus routes, would not approve such a change.

According to Claiborne Jones, vice chancellor of business and finance, the University felt that since people buying bus passes were promised the S route, its elimination would be unfair.
