Hilliard ends police duties

Chapel Hill Police Chief Sidney Hilliard's resignation was accepted by the Chapel Hill Board of Aldermen Monday night.

Hilliard, chief of the Chapel Hill force for approximately two years, said Wednesday he resigned for "personal and professional concerns" and refused to elaborate.

Hilliard said his resignation would become effective April 15. He plans to retire to his home in Florida.

Town Manager Kurt Jenne will be responsible for finding a replacement for Hilliard. Hilliard said he had not made any recommendations for the post.

Jenne said Tuesday he did not know whether Hilliard's successor would come from inside or outside the police force.

Amnesty chapter organized locally

In a world in which torture and detainment of political prisoners seem to have become more frequent, the news of such actions tends to travel faster and farther than the words of those who oppose such actions.

But as torture became more common as an administrative political tool in many countries, a group called Amnesty International was organized in the 1960s to oppose the torture and arrest of people on the basis of their political or religious beliefs.

Today, Amnesty International has members in more than 60 countries, and a chapter is being organized in Chapel Hill.

Andrew Blane, a history professor at City University of New York and the only American member of Amnesty International's nine-member International Executive Committee...

Executive Committee, was in Chapel Hill Wednesday to talk about some of the group's efforts.

Through its investigations, the group learned of the brutal treatment of political prisoners in many countries around the world.

Blane said the group's major goal is to make the public aware of the problems which exist, so Amnesty International can build up well-recognized credibility.

The group's efforts have had some results. Amnesty International played an important role in getting the U.S. Congress to pass legislation allowing Congress to cut off U.S. aid to nations in which torture was known to be used.

Nigerian officials visit UNC

Three education officials of the Nigerian government visited the UNC campus Tuesday as part of a tour of universities and technical institutions in North Carolina.

The purpose of the visit was to explore opportunities for vocational training of Nigerians in North Carolina in such areas as agriculture and industrial skills.

"In Nigeria, the demand of industry for skilled workers has far exceeded our training ability," Nigerian director of Higher Education J.S. Attah said.

UNC proposes to train approximately 200 Nigerians in the areas of vocational and technical skills, health and agriculture, according to David Lilly, dean of the education school.

Nigeria is in the process of revamping its educational system and making primary education compulsory.

Under the proposed system, children would attend six years of primary school and five years of secondary school.

There are 13 universities in Nigeria with a total enrollment of about 25,000, Attah said. The population of Nigeria is 80 million.

In addition, male children are given more support and encouragement to pursue their education than females, Attah said.

Last October, Congress used this legislation to cut off much of the U.S. aid to Uruguay after Amnesty International helped bring congressional attention to torture of political prisoners in that country.

Blane was encouraged, but he said he wonders if the United States might let security and defense considerations outweigh human rights in some other countries.

The adoption group, Rubenstein said, "adopts" specific political prisoners and works to get better treatment or release for the prisoners.

Amnesty International periodically focuses on specific nations. In March and April, the group will be making a concentrated effort to end torture and help political prisoners in Chile.
