

Carolina cracks past ACC 13-0 in home opener

Carolina pounded four Atlantic Christian pitchers for 12 hits and 13 runs as the Tar Heels sped to a 13-0 win in their home debut Tuesday at Boshamer Stadium.

Sophomore Greg Norris stopped the Bulldogs on six singles while striking out nine en route to his first varsity shutout and UNC's fourth victory of the season against five losses.

Carolina hosts the undefeated Catamounts of Western Carolina in a doubleheader today at 1 p.m.

After scoring an unearned run in the first inning, Carolina burst into a four run lead with three runs in the second. The inning was highlighted by third baseman Randy Warrick's two run triple which scored Bernie Menapace and freshman Dwight Lowry.

The Tar Heels tallied once in both the third and fourth frames and then exploded in the sixth, sending nine men to the plate to score four times.

Singles by Lowry and Warrick and doubles by designated hitter Jim Waugh and leftfielder Steve Coats gave UNC a 10-0 lead.

Coach Walter Rabb was especially pleased with his team's hitting because it came against lefthanded pitching, the thing he feared most with a lineup stacked with lefthanders.

"The word got around on us and we'll see nothing but lefthanders all year," he said. "The situation is especially tough because we don't have any lefthanders on our staff to practice against."

After knocking out lefties Neil Baker, Tim Ross and Randy Faircloth, Atlantic

Christian righthander Jim Satterfield entered the game in the seventh and gave up a two-run homer to Brad Lloyd. The Tar Heels ended the scoring with another unearned run in the eighth on the fifth and sixth Bulldog errors of the game.

Warrick, Coats, Kevin Haerberle and second baseman Jim Atkinson all had two hits to lead the Tar Heel hitting. UNC also stole three bases.

After walking the first man, the 6-foot-3 Norris frustrated the Bulldogs all afternoon, retiring 13 in a row at one point.

"Norris gave us a pretty good performance today," Rabb said. "Our pitchers were a little wild on the Florida trip but each improved in the second outing. I think there's two or three on the staff that can really be stoppers."

Rabb said that his starting pitchers today will be Bob Thomson in the first game and Matt Wilson in the second.

The home stand continues Thursday with Old Dominion, Friday with High Point and Saturday with Campbell. The Tar Heels' first conference opponent will be N.C. State when the Wolfpack visits March 24.

LaGarde reinjured; out for year

UNC Coach Dean Smith said in a press conference Tuesday that LaGarde's knee locked up during practice Monday. Doctors will operate early next week. LaGarde first injured his knee during practice Feb. 11 in preparation for the Tulane game. Carolina has since won nine straight games.

"We've adjusted to playing without Tommy a lot better than without Walter," Smith said.

Davis was able to shoot extremely well during practice, Smith said, even though his index finger was taped to his middle finger.

UNC Coach Don Skakle said after the match that he would go with the same singles lineup today, but he was undecided about the third doubles team.

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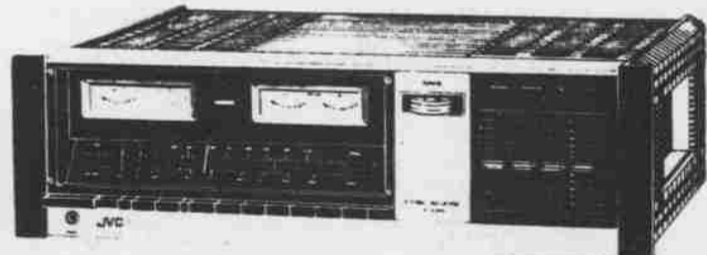
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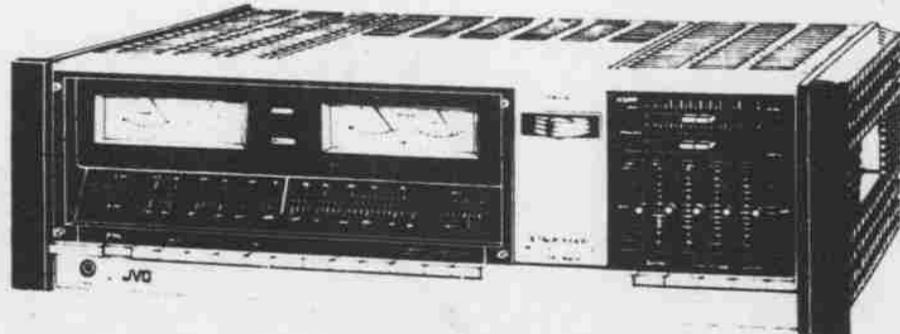
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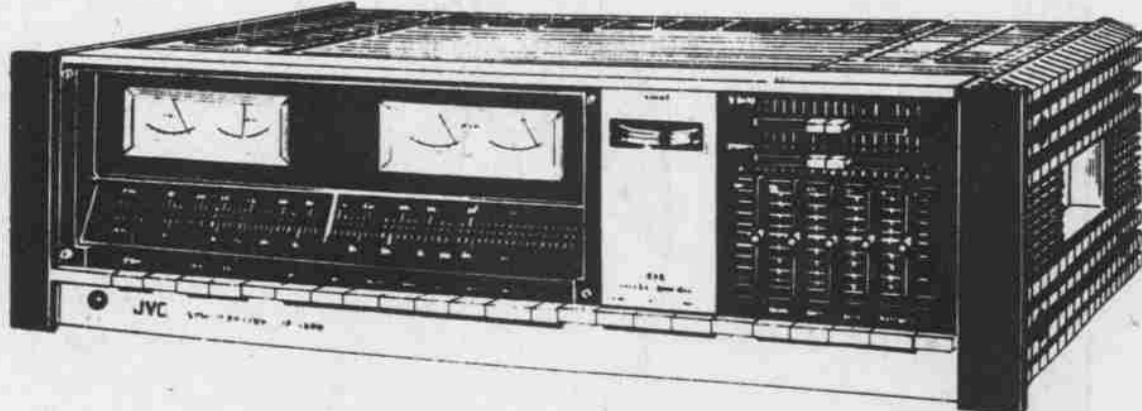
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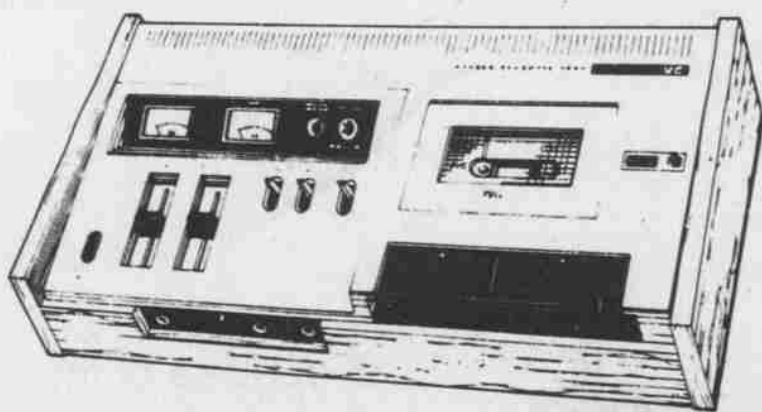
