"Everybody thinks it's a stall. It's not," O'Koren said. "We get layups. With them (the Wildcats) being a non-conference team, they don't know much about it. We knew we had to get the tempo set. They were concentrating on Givens. It didn't look good for us. But we kept our poise, our confidence."

With Ford sitting this one out, Kuester went to point guard and Tom Zaliagiris was inserted to fill the big-guard role. Twice the 6-foot-5 junior was tied up for jump balls in the spread offense, but he said that the team did not get flustered.

"The way we look at it, it's better to hold it for a jump ball then try a chance pass that the other team might steal," he said. "We

don't panic. The way they played defense today is the way we play it in practice." Zaliagiris then spoke briefly on the Four Corners, itself.

"If it hasn't revolutionized basketball by now, it won't," he said in response to a question concerning a 30-second clock. "I don't think it's that good of an offense without the players to run it. I know we tried it in high school. We were terrible. But you look at us (UNC). Phil and me have three years experience running it. John and Walter have been here four. That's what? Fourteen years of experience? Something like that."

Apparently the years have paid off. The Tar Heels held off a late scare by Kentucky and now are headed for Atlanta.

Biostats assistant prof Joan Lingner dies around campus

Joan Lingner, 39, assistant professor of biostatistics, died suddenly of natural causes Feb. 28 in Manila, the Philippines. She was in the Philippines studying demographic trends of the country as a consultant for the World Health Organization and as a representative of UNC Laboratories for Population Statistics.

Margaret Blew, 85, a former public health professor, died Feb. 17 in Lexington, Mo. She taught in the Department of Public Health Nursing in the School of Public Health from 1941 until her retirement in 1962.

James J. Gallagher, a Kenan professor of education, received the national Association of Children with Learning Disabilities' (ACLAD) highest honor, the ACLAD Award, March 11, in Washington, D.C., at the association's 14th international conference. Gallagher directs the Frank Porter Graham Child Development Center, a division of the University's Child Development Institute.

Charles N. Reilly, Kenan professor of chemistry, and Royce W. Murray, professor of chemistry, have received a National Science Foundation grant of \$121,700 for electrochemical research. They will use the grant for a project entitled "Fundamental Studies of Electrochemical Processes, Techniques, Instrumentation," which will

receive funding for three years and will explore the reactions of metal surfaces. M. Stephen Mahaley Jr. has been named professor of surgery and chief of the division of neuro surgery in the School of Medicine. He comes to Chapel Hill from Duke University Medical Center where he had been on the faculty since 1965. At Duke, he anatomy and associate professor of neurosurgery.

Prof awarded grant for research project

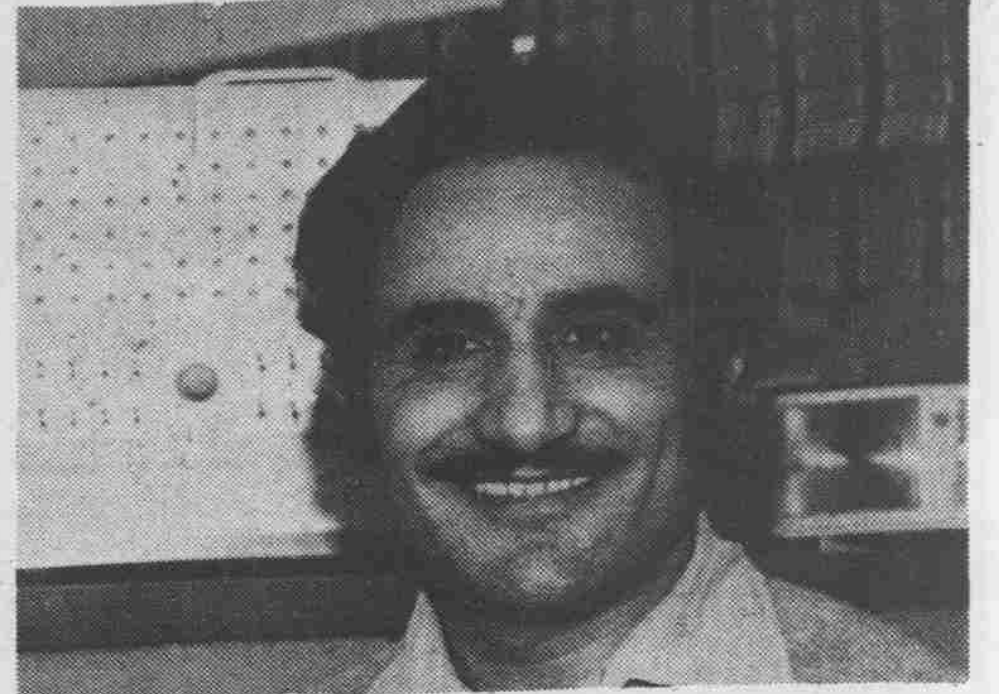
The National Science Foundation has awarded a UNC political science professor a grant totaling \$21,610 to conduct the first Undergraduate Research Participation Program here this summer. Edward Azar has received a grant to fund the program, which will offer jobs to 10 students, five from UNC-CH and five from other North Carolina universities.

Each student will earn \$90 a week and will participate in one of five projects defined by the political science department. The projects will deal mainly with gathering international conflict data, studying OPEC nations and learning to implement research.

Azar will head the program, which will be staffed by political science graduate students. Undergraduates with at least sophomore standing are eligible. Azar stresses that students participating in the program do not have to be political science majors.

But they should have an interest in international relations, make decent grades and obtain a letter of recommendation from a University professor.

Azar said he is enthusiastic about the grant and pleased at obtaining it. "In the area of political science throughout the country, there are only three people who got this grant," he said. "It should be good for the students and me."

Azar said the grant would be renewed next year. "There is potential for renewal from three to at least five years with more students eligible next year."
