The policies of LSDAS are determined by the Law School Admissions Council (LSAC), an organization composed of one representative from each accredited law school. Hendon said that the LSAC services committee, made up of professors and representatives from various law schools, determines how LSDAS will compute the transcripts.

"The law schools in the late 1960s experienced an increase in applications, and with that there was a significant increase in the amount of clerical work for the law-school admissions offices," Hendon said. "The law schools therefore saw a need for a service to act as a central processor of transcripts."

Prior to the creation of LSDAS, each law

school would handle its own transcripts and compute applicants' undergraduate GPAs by their own policies, thereby increasing the variables and paperwork. One of the main purposes of LSDAS is to allow law-school admissions offices more time to consider the individual applicants by reducing their clerical work and providing a standard computation of individual GPAs.

Director of Records Raymond Strong, whose department will handle the addition of the pluses and minuses, said the department sends the transcripts to Princeton with an explanation of UNC's grading policy.

"I'd suggest the students tell us to do away with pluses and minuses," Strong said. "We don't like them anyway."

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Inequities slowly dissolving in women's athletics

Female athletes received only three grants-in-aid for the 1975-76 academic year, but the women's program is successfully expanding, according to a report presented to the Faculty Council Friday by the Committee on Athletics.

Male athletes for the same year received 257 grants-in-aid, but UNC women's basketball Coach Angela Lumpkin said she still is optimistic.

"You can't just start and give women an equal number of scholarships," Lumpkin said.

Three years ago no grants-in-aid were awarded to women.

In the 1974-75 school year, only one grant-in-aid was received by a female; this year 16 women are on scholarship, and next year as many as 30 or 40 will be on grants-in-aid, according to the report.

"We've come so far in two years," Lumpkin said. "We're so much better off than other universities."

UNC women students now have 12

varsity teams compared to eight during 1975-76, with the possible addition of women's soccer as the 13th team in the coming year. Men's varsity teams number 13. "It is evident that parity between the sexes has been achieved in terms of the number of available athletic opportunities," the report said.

But parity has not been reached in monetary terms, the report noted. Men received a total of \$519,789.32 compared to \$7,670.50 for the women.

The three female grants-in-aid in 1975-76 went to basketball, tennis and swimming athletes. The swimmer received the largest grant, totaling \$2,720.75. The tennis player received \$1,986.75 and the basketball player, \$950.

According to the report, the men's football team received the most money in grants-in-aid, totaling \$276,356.71 for 108 different scholarships. Nineteen basketball players received a total of \$49,318.92 in scholarships, and 37 baseball players received a total of \$39,363.27 for the third-highest amount.
