

Drive gets underway for Hoffman infant

Various campus organizations are collecting money to help former Carolina basketball player Brad Hoffman with medical expenses for his two-month-old son. The expenses are estimated between \$30,000 and \$40,000.

Student Government volunteers will collect money in front of the Student Union this week. Phil Ford and Jeff Wolf also will participate in the collection.

according to Nancy Butler, chairperson of the project. Beta Theta Pi fraternity and Chi Omega sorority will sponsor a car wash Thursday to raise money for the Hoffman family. Money from both fun-raising drives will be sent to the Brad Hoffman Trust Fund set up by Charles Collings of Sacramento, Cal., a friend of the Hoffmans. Hoffman's wife, Becky, gave birth to twin boys, Nathaniel and Benjamin, Feb. 4. Benjamin suffered a

massive brain hemorrhage when he was 17 days old, which caused his head to enlarge because of accumulated fluid in his brain. He has had two operations to drain the fluid. A third operation may be needed this week, Hoffman's wife said.

Benjamin has been in a Sacramento hospital intensive-care unit for nine weeks.

DC9 crashes near Atlanta

DALLAS, Ga. (UPI)—A Southern Airways DC9 carrying 85 persons, trying to crash land with both engines flamed out, hurtled through a store and across a highway "like a tornado" Monday and exploded into flames.

The State Patrol in Atlanta said estimated casualties reported by troopers at the scene came to 51 fatalities and 31 injured. Other sources ran much higher.

At Metro Ambulance service in Atlanta, spokesman Bob Boland said, "We're hearing approximately 100 to 139 dead."

Hilliard said Monday he submitted the report to Town Manager Kurt Jenne about a month ago. He added that the report contained a more specific policy rule for officers carrying their weapons while off duty.

He declined to comment on the rest of the report until the Board of Aldermen have considered it. Jenne said Monday he had not examined the department's report, but he expects to submit it to the board within two weeks.

Alderman Robert Epting requested the report from the town manager at the Jan. 10 meeting of the board. He said he wanted to see both the SBI report and a general report on the policy of off-duty officers carrying weapons.

Chief Hilliard said the SBI report is not included in the police report. The report is privilege information, Hilliard said, and even he doesn't have a copy.

The department has its weapon policy because officers are sworn to uphold the law 24 hours a day, Hilliard said. He added that "probably 90 per cent of the police departments in the state have the same kind of policy for their officers."
