We Will Freeze in The Dark—This report on energy conservation includes

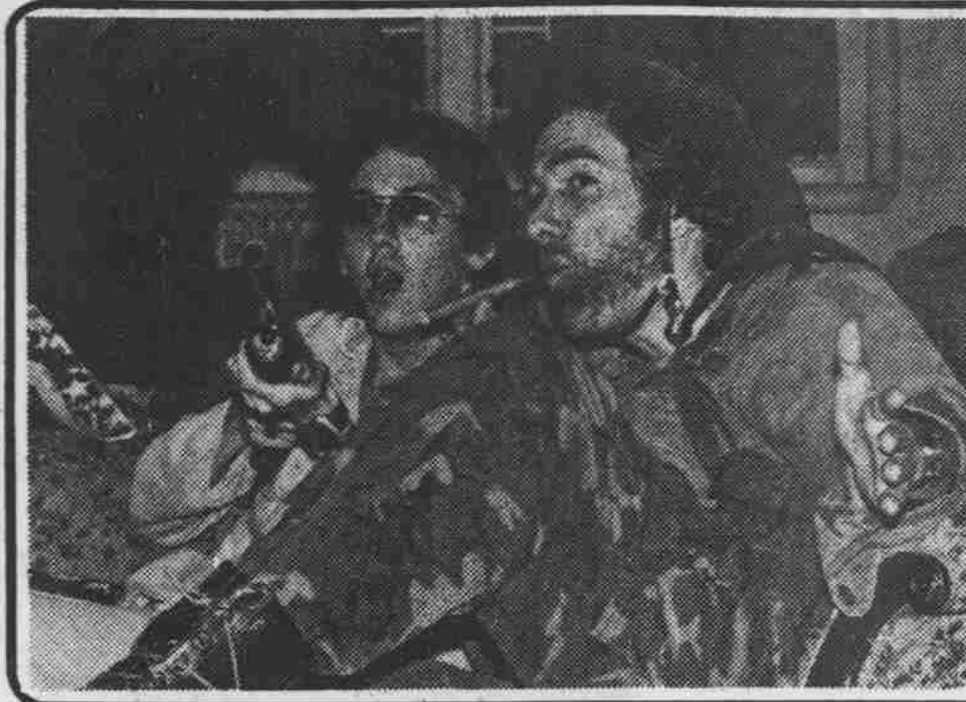

The characters consist of contrasts: Harold Ryan, the picture of masculinity, a pilot who dropped the first atomic bomb, and two game hunters lost in the Amazon for seven years. On the other hand there is Penelope, Harold's wife, and her two suitors. The crew get together to celebrate Harold's return with a birthday cake for a girl named Wanda June who was run over by an ice cream truck.

Disappointed seniors find they can't graduate

Each year, approximately 100 seniors find out too late that they lack enough credits to graduate on time.

"I had taken a lot of physical education courses, and my adviser counted three of these as hours toward graduation," said one senior, who learned several weeks ago that she lacked necessary hours toward graduation.

But most seniors with such problems can't blame them on their advisers, said Anne Coenen of the arts and sciences office.

"Only six out of these 100 have problems because of their advisers," she said. "The rest are mistakes mainly of student neglect."

Coenen said most problems would not occur if students checked with the arts and sciences office a semester before they plan to graduate. Approximately 1,500 seniors graduate each year.

Department advisers are not responsible for graduation requirements being fulfilled by students, Coenen said. "Of course, business, journalism and education majors are taken care of by their own departments, but we want to impress upon new juniors and upcoming seniors under arts and sciences to see us as soon as possible."

Advisers in South Building usually are swamped at the end of the semester, and Coenen said hundreds of students may not be helped if they wait too long.

"Students often feel that physical education activity counts toward graduation, but it doesn't," Coenen said. "We recommend that students check with us in the fall before spring graduation. They should also check with us once a year before that."

Marijuana legalization expected

Goode said that because of conflicting research and testimony, he is not sure how dangerous marijuana is, but he classifies it with caffeine and aspirin. "The medical jury is still hung on the issue, and it is not as harmless as caffeine and aspirin, but it is about the same," he said.

But Goode recently wrote in a column in *The Charlotte Observer*, "The question of marijuana's criminal status will not be answered by consulting the medical journals. The answer is all around us—in the streets, in the homes, on the green lawns of our parks and campuses."

Goode said he favors legalizing marijuana, but he said he believes an age

limit should be imposed on use of the drug. "It's necessary that an age limit should be set on things like marijuana, alcohol and driving. I am not sure where to draw the limit, but if the very young get into drugs, it can cause psychological trouble."

"There are two things that could affect adolescents. It's possible that a young person could latch onto drugs they do not understand, which is the same with alcohol. Also, marijuana may

cause a hormonal change while the person is maturing."

Goode said he was first exposed to marijuana as a graduate student at Columbia University. He began studying and researching drugs in 1967. Since then he has written three books on drugs.

A NORML chapter is being formed at UNC, and the national organization has asked Goode to be the faculty adviser.

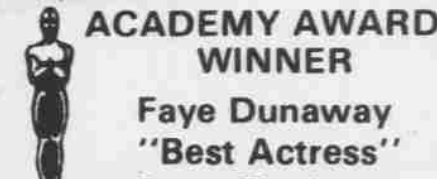
