obstruction of justice statute was also instrumental, Reston said. "Nixon wanted to patronize Frost as a show business character. As it came out, Frost was really explaining the law to him." Reston said he handed Frost the statute as he was passing through the gate of the Monarch Bay estate to begin the Watergate interview.

For the moment, Reston, a lecturer in creative writing since 1971, is winding down form his "sensational" experience in Washington and Monarch Bay, looking forward to the publication of a book, *The Innocence of Joan Little: A Southern Mystery*, and readying himself to teach again in the fall. Yesterday he viewed the final Nixon-Frost episode with Frost in Washington and today he will appear at an National Press Club luncheon where Frost will be the speaker.

Reston seemed relieved that the tremendous promotional hype was almost over. The man who recently called a press conference to deny leaking information to the Washington Post said, "I've never been involved in this kind of situation. This project contained a degree of subtlety
