

I read with growing astonishment the article about West Germany by Peter Hapke in the DTH last Tuesday. Was that the same country which I left seven weeks ago? Did the students return earlier from their vacation to become murderers and to make the revolution? Does W. Germany stand before a civil war? Peter Hapke drew this picture probably because of ignorance of the actual situation. From this article I'm sure that many American students have gotten the wrong impression about German students' supposed involvement in terroristic

There exists no relationship between the students and the Baader-Meinhof group and the Red Army Fraction, the groups who are responsible for the murders of Ponto, Buback and Drenckmann, except the fact that many members of both groups are former drop-out students without any basis in the universities. The student governments do not even support the ideological ideas of the terrorists; just the opposite, students express their disapproval of these kinds of "revolutionary strategies."

Indeed the German students are "angry' about the attempt to clamp down on the liberal movement, but these attempts of the government cannot be justified by the assertion that the campuses are a breeding ground for radicals. However, the government's goal is to cut off the critical movement of its politics at the universities. It tries to denounce the students for
