Director of WUNC resigns; supervised radio's rebuilding

Donald M. Trapp has resigned as director of WUNC radio to begin working for a family-owned radio station and newspaper in western North

A UNC graduate with B.A. and M.A. degrees in communication, Trapp was radio projects manager for the Corporation for Public Broadcasting in Washington, D.C., before returning to Chapel Hill in 1974.

Trapp assembled a staff and supervised the reconstruction of broadcasting facilities for WUNC. which went off the air in 1970 after a storm damaged equipment.

Gary Shivers, assistant director of the station, was the first to be hired by Trapp. Most of the original staff still

"He was tremendously influential in


drawing a lot of talented people to the staff," Shivers said. "He not only gave us jobs, but provided the inspiration, guidance and freedom to make the station what it was."

Shivers will be acting director until a permanent appointment is made.

In a UNC News Bureau release, Trapp said, "Helping bring WUNC to life was a great opportunity and a great experience, and I want to thank the University for letting me be a part of it

"Most public radio stations are licensed to universities, and I've seen and heard lots of them, but never have I seen such strong and enthusiastic support as WUNC has received from the University at Chapel Hill. And I never have seen such acceptance from the listening audience."

Wallace appoints committee to study town noise ordinance

Chapel Hill Mayor Jim Wallace has announced the appointment of a committee to study possible amendments to the town noise

The committee is composed of representatives from the University community, including both faculty and students. The group will consider the use of sound-level meters to enforce noise limits.

Wallace said he would appoint the committee after several student leaders appeared at a town board meeting and expressed a desire to discuss proposed changes in the ordinance.

Alderman Marvin Silver, a UNC physics professor, was appointed as chairperson of the committee. Silver said Monday he will introduce technical information and examples of other town's ordinances to the committee.

The noise ordinance has drawn criticism from many students because of its subjective approach. Police issue warnings to party-goers after one complaint, and usually shut down a party after two complaints.

Other members of the committee are: Ross MacDonald, a UNC physics professor; Bill Moss, student body president; Bain Jones, president of the Residence Hall Association; Frederick Behrends, a UNC history professor: Robert Peters, director of the Speech and Hearing Scientific Institute; and Grady Thomas, director of the Hearing and Speech Center.

Milton Heath, associate director of the Institute of Government, and William Campbell, assistant director of the Institute of Government, will serve as advisers to the group.
