UNC to continue with Servomation

The University will continue to contract with Servomation Corp. for campus food service as long as Servomation provides adequate service for students and staff, Vice Chancellor for Business and Finance John Temple said this week.

The understanding between the University and Servomation is similar to one between an employer and his employee, Temple said.

"We have found them as responsive to our desires as we find our employees, so we have not thought in terms of termination," he said. "As long as they can do the job, we'll keep them."

Sales at the Carolina Union snack bar have increased 54 percent since last year, according to Dick Patton, Servomation general manager. The record gross for a week last year was \$8,800. One week this month the snack bar grossed \$15,000, which Patton attributed to increased patronage due to the Homecoming football game.

Weekly sales in the Pine Room have increased from \$21,500 per week last year to \$25,000 per week this year.

Weekly sales at Chase Cafeteria amount to approximately \$14,500, up 8 percent from last year, Patton said.

A continuing contract exists between Servomation and the University. It may be terminated with a 60-day notice by either party, provided that food service is continued until the end of the semester.

"We continually review food service," Temple said. Evaluations are based on observations made throughout the year by officials of the Office of Business and Finance and the Division of Student Affairs.

"We will make a decision as to whether to keep Servomation between now and February,"

Temple said. "We have to make our decision by February because it will be too late to contract for new service for the next fall after that time."

Temple said students could provide views on food service by sending him a letter, talking to Servomation management or contacting members of the Food Services Advisory Committee.

The University maintains contact with alternative food services, Temple said. "Dean (James) Casler (of the student affairs division) and I have looked at food service at UNC-Greensboro and Duke. We have also talked to Hardees and McDonalds."

"We want to keep in touch with what is available, but we have given no encouragement to those businesses that we will terminate our contract with Servomation."

Temple expressed satisfaction with recent Servomation service. "The feedback I have been getting has indicated that the service is in better shape than it has been," he said.

Temple said his office usually meets with Servomation corporate management three or four times per year.

He said his approval is required for all price increases in food units. If documentation warrants the price increase, Temple said he generally grants it. Servomation has mentioned raising the price of some meat items.
