

## Flu brought by out-of-staters?

A few students with flu-like symptoms coughing, muscle aches and fever up to 103 degrees - have trudged to the Student Health Service this week, and doctors there say they feel the number of student flu cases may increase in coming weeks.

Outbreaks of Type A2 Texas influenza in Pennsylvania and New Jersey are confirmed in the latest information from the Communicable Disease Center in Atlanta, and Dr. James McCutchan of the Student Health Service speculates that the strain may have been carried back to Chapel Hill by students who went home to those states for

"Influenza does what it wants to do," McCutchan said. "I would guess there's going to be more cases, but that's not

McCutchan said he is hesitant to label any one case of illness as influenza, due to the expense of lab confirmation of the illness. "It costs \$30 to find out if what you've got

is flu, and then they'li tell you to take aspirin. Most people would take the aspirin first and save the \$30."

Chapel Hill is one of the hot spots statewide, according to Dr. J. M. MacCormick of the state Communicable Discase Control Branch

Most confirmed cases have been the A2 Texas strain, MacCormick said, but that strain is related to last year's A2 Victoria, so there is some degree of immunity in the general population. An outbreak of influenza in Russia.

## To take on village flavor Pizza Hut okayed downtown

The pizza controversy is over. After heated opposition and architectural changes, Pizza Hut has found a home at 112 W. Franklin St.

Out of character with its usual design, the Pizza Hut will be located in the renovated Campus Party Store Building and is scheduled to open Feb. 6.

"There are 3,000 Pizza Huts in the world, and there is not another one like this," Dave Morris of Pizza Hut said.

The refurbished building where the Pizza Hut is located will be called the Pure Building, after the Pure Oil station what was once on the property.

- In addition to the Pizza Hut, Owen Gwyn, owner of the property, will rent spaces to Wedge and Racket, a golf and tennis shop; and electrical supply and repair shop; and Three Witches, a gift store.

The Pizza Hut has been in developmental stages for almost a year. Gwyn decided last March not to rent the property to Pizza Hut after battling with the town for two months.

Pizza Hut was not given a building permit because Alderman Robert Epting appealed issuance of the permit to the board of adjustment. The appeal failed, but because Pizza Hut had not submitted a local developmental-impact assessment, the permit was delayed further.

Robert Page, a local lawyer representing Pizza Hut, threatened to challenge the assessment requirement in court. He contended the requirement was not established until after the building permit was approved.

It was at this point that Gwyn decided not to rent to Pizza Hut because of town inconsistencies. He said he felt the project had met all guidelines.

Last summer Gwyn decided to renovate the building to make it acceptable to the

Morris said it was difficult to convince the Pizza Hut parent company to accept a nonimage building, but because the business wanted to be on Franklin Street so badly, it consented. Morris said Pizza Hut has been looking for a Franklin Street location for about six years.

Epting had maintained that a Pizza Hut with parking in front would create traffic problems and change the character of Franklin Street. The newly styled Pizza Hut meets his approval, he said Thursday.

"The building is a landmark now," Epting said. "It pleases me that Pizza Hut has come to take part in the community and hasn't tried to give us 'Anywhere, USA."
