UNC team takes third in tourney

The UNC Individual Events Team placed third last weekend in the Plainsman Tournament at Auburn University. Morehouse College of Atlanta finished first in the contest.

Eighteen schools participated in the tournament. Three teams were ranked in the top 10 nationally.

"At this point we think we would probably be good enough to finish in the top 20 in the country," said member Tom Preston.

Nine team members qualified for the National Forensics Association Individual Events Tournament to be held in April at Monmouth College in West Long Branch, N.J.

Among outstanding individual placings, in extemporaneous speaking, Preston, David Hopkins and Ralph Thompson

finished third, fourth and fifth, respectively. In dramatic interpretation, Ralph Weeks, Maureen Maney and Debra Davis finished third, fifth and sixth, respectively. Thompson finished sixth in prose interpretation and second in poetry interpretation. Maney also placed in poetry interpretation, finishing fourth.

In dual interpretation of drama, team of Thompson and Roz Fuse finished third, while the team of Stacey Cox and Jan Huffman placed fourth.

The next events tournament will be Feb. 11 at LaSalle College in Philadelphia, followed by the Morehouse Feldman Invitation March 2 through 4 in Atlanta.
