State wrestlers lose cash during match

A thief entered the locked Woolen Gym dressing room of the N.C. State wrestling team during a match Saturday night, escaping with belongings worth \$205.

A University Police report said the thief took a watch, a wallet and cash totaling \$182 from 11 team members.

Both doors to the dressing room were locked when the team left at 7:50 p.m., according to Robert J. Guzzo, State's wrestling coach.

Carter E. Mario, a UNC wrestler, said he noticed a person in the hallway leading from Carmichael Auditorium past the dressing room during the match. The police report described the suspect as a 16- to 18-year-old, 5-foot-8 black male wearing a green sweatshirt. No arrests have been made.

Officer Leon R. Ivey of the University Police said he walked past the dressing room twice during the match but saw nothing to suggest anything was amiss.

"It's embarrassing to have something happen like that," Ivey said, "but you know, the door was locked."
