Shutz heads four-course committee

encouraged to consider offering a limited number of courses ranging from two to six hours of credit per semester.

Schutz said recently that, "I would have sacrificed all of the other recommendations if only the four-course load would have been accepted. With the four-course load, students can do better work. It is a policy mistake for the University that the curriculum disperses student energy as our present system does."

The report stated, "The committee feels that shifting to a four-course load per semester... is educationally sound and advantageous. We believe it will enhance teaching, learning and the quality of the undergraduate degree. If a student can concentrate on four courses, rather than five, he should be able to attain better focus and depth."

Justifications for the four-course load included that:

- Among schools structured on the two-

semester calendar, the general trend is toward four courses per semester.

- Undergraduates who take 100-level courses are put at a disadvantage with graduate students who are expected to take only four courses.

- The university has a reasonably select, able and responsible student body which can be expected, and, therefore, should be encouraged to work intensively.

- The shift from five to four courses would not be a net reduction in effort on the part of students or faculty.

- It can reduce the total number of courses, braking expensive and sometimes needless course proliferation.

"Some of the faculty thought it would be an actual reduction in educational effort or feared it would be seen that way," Schutz said. "It was difficult to persuade them that the issue was quality versus quantity."

"It is my belief that we should shape the college

to the needs of the best students — do the best for the best, and then ask the others to do their best. We should not shape the curriculum for the average student."

Schutz said that the time has come with a new dean, a new budget and an increase in student enrollment for the four-course load to be studied again. The main purpose should be to get improvement into the system and to get the student to do better, Schutz said.

"The four-course load can be compared to listening to a stereo," Schutz said. "Instead of changing the channel from station to station, why don't we just sit down and listen to an entire album? I just wonder whether the undergraduate experience has any cohesiveness."
