'Somebody' leaves Farrah out in the cold

Cinema Somebody Killed Her Husband

Somebody Killed Her Husband is everything it should not be. Slow-paced, coldly lit and stiffly acted, the film is flat and devoid of any feeling. A good deal of this is due to Farrah Fawcett-Majors, who stars, but the guilt is not hers alone.

The screenwriter, cinematographer, director and, most importantly, the producers, who were incompetent enough to put up money for this dreary mess, also must accept part of the blame.

Unfortunately for her fans, Farrah proves one thing in *Somebody Killed Her Husband*—she cannot act. Her style is about as exciting as watching an ice cube melt. It is not the usual stiff, amateurish acting that might be expected; instead, she exhibits a strange style, best described as frigid.

She goes through the motions, but she cannot show emotions. You don't believe what she does because there is no feeling behind it. She has several fits of anger, but little more happens than her voice turning into a mousy squeak. But she tries, she tries hard, and she should get credit for what little success she has. God knows nobody else tried to help her.

The screenwriter certainly didn't, providing a script so far off target one wonders if he knew who he was writing for. At the start of the film, Jerry Green (Jeff Bridges) spots Jenny Moore (Farrah) in the toy department of *Macy's*. She drops a box of pretzels, he picks them up, and within an hour they are engaged in love. Later, the two get together at her apartment in order to consummate their love, but before they can get down to things her husband arrives and they must flee upstairs. Our lovers return downstairs to find the husband dead with a rather large butcher knife sticking out of his back. The rest of the film is devoted

to their attempts at solving this dastardly crime.

Jeff Bridges plays his role as a New York intellectual neurotic who has written 29 unpublished children's books fairly well, using a style imitative of Woody Allen. This is too bad, because his character is the worst possible one that could have been placed opposite Farrah. Any intelligent character placed opposite hers makes Farrah seem as intelligent as a computer with a pulled plug. Bridges sits and emotes intellectually while Farrah sits and smiles. You have to pity the poor woman. She just doesn't belong.

Andrew Laszlo, the Cinematographer, doesn't help her much either, constantly surrounding her with cold, chilling blues. Farrah is often clothed in blue, enclosed by blue or shadowed by blue lights. We already know she's frigid as an actress. We don't need to be told it again and again.

The makers of *Somebody Killed Her Husband* should have taken a better look at their star. In surrounding her with thought, the producers of the movie have done a horrible thing. Instead of shielding Farrah with fast action and heavy humor, they have left her naked, open, looking hollow and blank.

The producers ignored Farrah's sex appeal in trying to cast her in a semi-thoughtful role. In their search for intellectual jollies, they have abandoned a successful formula and created a movie that leaves the audience wishing for *Charlie's Angels* because at least it is entertaining.

"Mr. Boone contacted me twice. The last time was in August," Thurman Tripp said. "He wanted me to meet with the aldermen to discuss selling the land, but I told him it would be a waste of time since the land was not for sale."

"Under no condition will that land be for sale as long as my mother wants to live there. If they try and condemn it, I'll be forced to either sell it or fight, and fighting city hall in condemnations proceedings can be long and drawn out."

Larry Belken, a Carrboro city planner who has worked closely with the project, said the town will proceed with getting an appraisal of the land. If the bond is approved, the town will then offer the appraised value to Mrs. Tripp in hopes of purchasing the land. Belken said if the owner rejects the plan completely the town probably will begin condemnation through court proceedings.

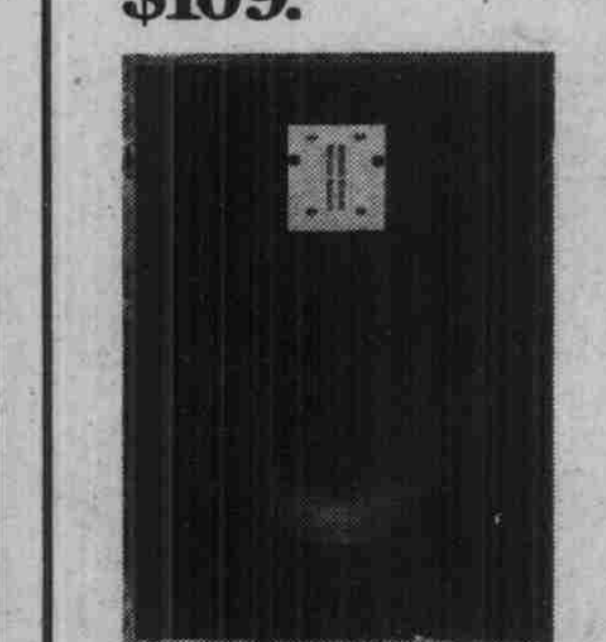

"The town is proceeding according to federal land acquisition guidelines," Belken said. "Nothing has been condemned. This site was selected from 13 pieces of land, and examined over a two-month period. It is by far the best site possible. It met all the qualities we wanted, and offers a great opportunity for the town to get a good piece of land. What will happen is unclear, but the bond doesn't specify a site so the things it provides for can be built on another site."

However, Belken said the Tripp property far surpassed all other possible sites, because it is easily accessible to town, relatively flat and water and sewage, which are crucial to construction of the swimming pool, easily could be provided. He also said the site is convenient because the town already owns two acres of land adjoining the property and nearby University land could someday be included in the park area.

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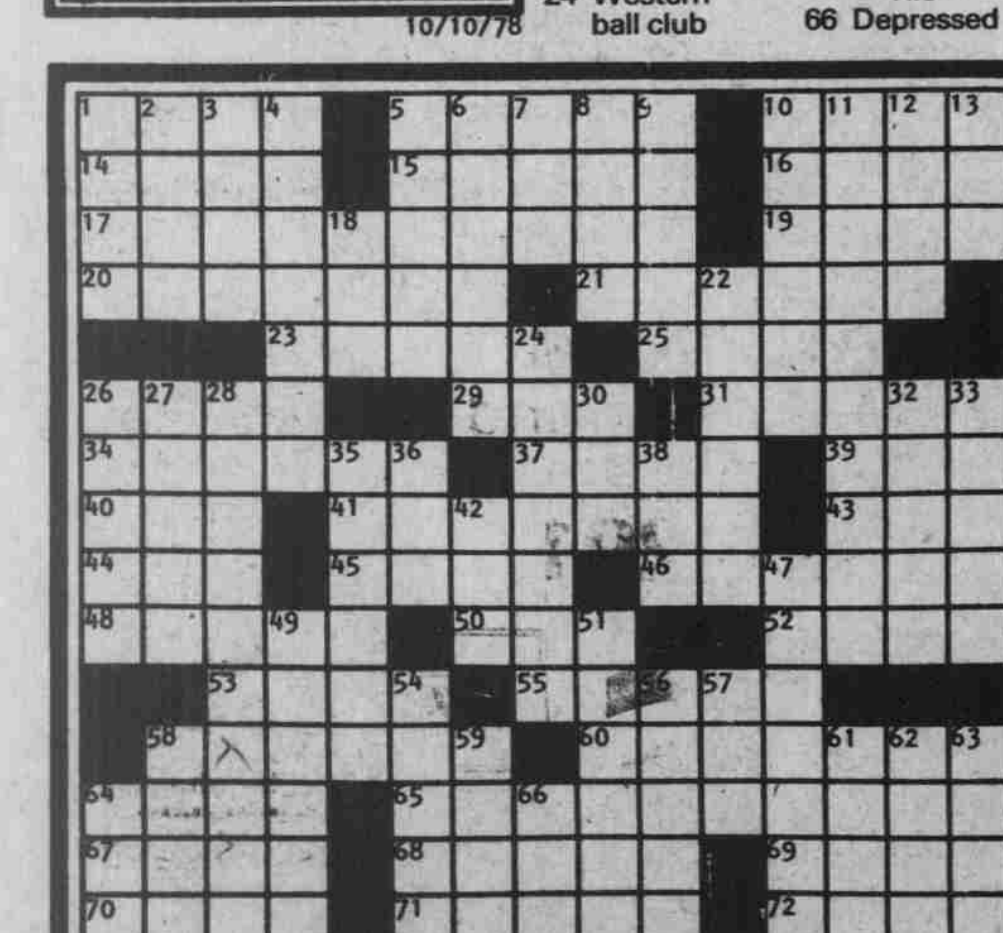
