





From page 'The town is proceeding according to federal land acquisition guidelines," Belken said. "Nothing has been condemned. This site was selected from 13 pieces of land, and examined over a two-month period. It is by far the best site possible. It met all the qualities we wanted, and offers a great opportunity for the town to get a good piece of land. What will happen is unclear, but the bond doesn't specify a site so the things it provides for can be built on another site."

However, Belken said the Tripp property far surpassed all other possible lown, relatively flat and water and sewage, which are crucial to construction of the swimming pool, easily could be provided. He also said the site is convenient because the town already owns two acres of land adjoining the property and nearby University land could someday be included in the park







