

Chapel Hill aldermen OK community center

Chapel Hill Aldermen Monday voted to begin construction of a new community center on Plant Road and renovation of the Hargraves Recreation Center on Henderson Street.

The board also sent a proposal for a traffic signal at the middle of the 100 block of Franklin Street to the Transportation Board after debating whether to restrict pedestrian flow there.

The approved community center will provide a six-lane indoor pool, a gymnasium and a 1,000-square-foot meeting room for teenagers. The center will cost approximately \$1.4 million.

The expansion of the Hargraves Center includes renovation of the pool and the present building. A 1,500-square-foot addition also will be constructed. The cost is approximately \$690,500.

In other action, the board voted to seek

advice from the Transportation Board on a proposed traffic signal at the mid-street crosswalk on Franklin Street.

The signal was proposed by Interim Town Manager Gene Shipman because there have been eight minor accidents at the crosswalk, mostly at dusk, in the past two years. Pedestrians now have right-of-way over vehicles.

Shipman said a signal also would facilitate traffic flow on Franklin Street.

Alderman Robert Epting opposed the signal. "Chapel Hill is one of the few places in the world where the pedestrian is still king," he said. "Also, I don't think we should have those ugly poles and ugly cables (necessary for a signal)."

Alderman R.D. Smith said he likes the possibility of a signal. "For 10 years I've heard people say that is an unsafe crosswalk," he said. "Anytime an automobile hits a person, it's serious."

The board voted 5-3 to send the matter to the Transportation Board.

News in Brief

Torrijos protege sworn in

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP)—A new national assembly Wednesday quickly elected Aristides Royo president of Panama to assume executive duties from the man who handpicked him, Brig. Gen. Omar Torrijos.

The 505-member National Assembly of Community Representatives, which has no legislative power, began a six-year term in a sweltering gymnasium and gave Royo 452 votes. He was unopposed. The assembly elected Ricardo de la Espriella as his vice president and both were promptly sworn in.

Egyptians arrive for peace talks

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Carter on Wednesday urged an arriving Egyptian delegation to "stay until we get this settled" as he prepared to open the next round of Middle East peace talks.

The goal of the talks is to draw three lines in the sands of the Sinai, a task which is all that remains in the way of a treaty that would end 30 years of warfare between Egypt and Israel.

Public works bill moves again

WASHINGTON (AP)—A compromise version of the \$10.2 billion energy and water development bill President Carter vetoed last week, now missing some of the major features he opposed, began its way through Congress on Wednesday.

The compromise deletes from the vetoed bill six water projects that were at the top of Carter's "hit list" for cancellation. Inclusion of any of them could have resulted in another veto.

Also deleted were initial construction funds for 11 other projects, although planning money was retained.

Hunt asks for Charlotte 3 report

Raleigh (AP)—Gov. Jim Hunt has asked for a report on the case of the Charlotte Three to help him decide whether to pardon them, said Hunt's legal counsel, Jack Coart.

The three—Jim Grant, J.J. Reddy and Charles Parker—were convicted in 1972 of the 1968 burning of the Lazy B Riding Stables near Charlotte. Fifteen horses died.

The U.S. Supreme Court refused to review the case last week, which means all three would have to serve their prison terms unless the governor acted in the case.

Raleigh police round up drug suspects

RALEIGH (AP)—City police Wednesday rounded up 145 persons charged in "Operation Sunshine," a four-month undercover investigation into area drug traffic.

Two-thirds of the suspects had been arrested by mid-day Wednesday. Police seized a variety of drugs, including marijuana, hashish, cocaine, amphetamines, LSD, heroin and an assortment of hallucinogens. Police valued the drugs at \$125,000.

Twenty-two people were also charged with selling stolen property, and police said they recovered property worth \$173,000, ranging from stereos and televisions to diamonds, emeralds, rubies and even electric ranges, dishwashers and microwave ovens.

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Beta fraternity, family offer scholarship fund

Beta Theta Pi fraternity is offering a \$500 scholarship this semester based on leadership, scholarship and personal vigor, to any male or female undergraduate.

The Jody Akers Memorial Scholarship was established in memory of James Jones Akers III, a Beta fraternity brother who was killed in an automobile accident in 1975.

Aker's parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Jones Akers II of Charlotte, set up a trust in 1975 in which they give \$500 every semester to the member of the Beta house who contributes most to the fraternity. They also endow the bi-annual, \$500 undergraduate scholarship.

"I want to encourage anyone to apply

for this scholarship," said Mike Jacobs, scholarship chairperson. "I want to stress that the scholarship is not based on financial need, although it will be taken into consideration."

Students interested in the scholarship should pick up applications at the Union information desk or the Financial Aid Office in Vance Hall.

Applications are due Nov. 1 and should be submitted to the Interfraternity Council in Suite B of the Carolina Union or mailed to the Beta House, 114 W. Columbia St.

Crime rate up last month

Criminals took advantage of the arrival of students and professors for the fall semester to increase the rate of burglaries, larcenies and auto thefts in September.

Ben Callahan, administrative assistant to the Chapel Hill police chief, said students are more often the victims than the perpetrators of local crimes.

"Whenever the number of people in a town increases, the opportunity for crime also increases," Callahan said, explaining that since school has begun there are more occupied apartments and homes to be broken into and more cars, bicycles, pocketbooks and wallets to be stolen.

Callahan pointed out there is an overall decrease in serious crime for the year, despite the September increase.

"Trends for the year are down, but in September they shot up again," he said. "The jump might signal an increase for the rest of the year."

According to Chapel Hill police crime reports, the number of burglaries jumped from 27 in August to 41 in September. In September 1977 there were 22 burglaries. From August to September, larcenies increased from 90 to 96 and motor vehicle thefts from three to eight.

Callahan said it is difficult to explain why some crimes increase more than others from month to month and from year to year.

"I wish I knew why," he said. "You can give all kinds of reasons, but who's to prove them right or wrong?"

However, Callahan did say the police department expects crime to continue to increase in coming months.
