selecting committee for review. Menache says part-time jobs open occasionally for teaching art classes. Two or three graduate students now work part-time, he says, as well as Richard Kinnaird, associate chairman of studio art at UNC, who teaches beginning painting.

Kinnaird said he took the Art School job "for fun, extra money and to contribute to the community." He said he encourages UNC art students to exhibit their work wherever they can, but that it isn't required. "It helps for seniors to exhibit competitively because of graduate school applications, but the show-record requirement (at UNC) is only one criterion," he said.

Students going off campus to exhibit, simply feel that they have a body of work ready for display, and are mostly older students, not undergraduates, according to Kinnaird.

The Horace Williams House, under the wing of the Chapel Hill Preservation Society, now provides space for exhibits of community and University artists.

Since Jan. 21 an exhibit of the Center Gallery, a local women's group, has been

on display at the house. It includes the work of 28 artists, including some from UNC. Kinnaird said a faculty member, a former undergraduate (now a practicing artist in New York) and former graduate student, are participating.

Joanne Rose, director of the house, said the recently inaugurated program to get more community art on exhibit is very flexible, as long as it is "appropriate to the setting and the community."

Though a non-profit organization, the house can provide price lists to prospective buyers, if the exhibitor wishes. Rose said the house charges a 20 percent commission, however, on any sale resulting from exhibit. Kinnaird said 20 percent is a fair commission, considering other galleries charge up to 40 percent.

Another community opportunity for exhibiting art is the YMCA on Airport Road. Eilene Bisgrove, yoga instructor, said the lobby will soon be available for long-term exhibits.

The Y also offers classes in oils, portraiture, lapidary jewelry, stonecutting, ceramics and water colors.

and they took it to court," Bellstone says. "The courts said the aldermen could not discriminate against them and said we would have to leave, too."

The flower ladies moved into the privately owned NCB Plaza, where they say it's warmer and "for the best," while vendors such as Leighton drift among private spots to sell their goods.

The flower ladies say they are pleased

with where they are, and Leighton is pleased with the business he has started.

"People were skeptical at first to buy from a hot dog stand, but now I have a grade A sanitation rating and that helps," he says. The qualifications for the rating are the same as those for carnival-type mobile food stands.

"No one knows better than me that if somebody got something bad, I'd have to close down."

Leighton plans to get another cart and someday open a store that sells Beefy's hot dogs. "One cart won't make you rich. I want to run several carts from that permanent place." For now he must continue getting permission from property owners to sell on their land.

Leighton hopes student response will bring him on campus. If so, he would hire students to drive the carts, he says. But a Board of Trustees regulation prohibits peddling or soliciting on campus property.

Rhodesia approves black majority rule

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (AP)—Rhodesia's non-black voters Tuesday overwhelmingly approved a new constitution that eventually will give control of this country to its black majority.

Results from 37 of the nation's 50 elections districts showed 85 percent approval, exceeding even the hopes of the constitution's chief backer, Prime Minister Ian Smith.

Right-wing opponents of the document declared that after years of warfare, Rhodesia's whites had "sold their souls to the devil."

Smith and his black colleagues in the bi-racial transitional government had told white voters the constitution was the only alternative to a takeover by black guerrillas based in adjacent countries.

Israel ousts guerilla suspects' families

NABLUS, Occupied West Bank (AP)—Israel's military government in the occupied West Bank drove the families of four Arab guerrilla suspects from their homes Tuesday and bulldozed the dwellings, leaving at least 40 persons homeless.

Nabul Mayor Bassam Shaka said the Israeli officers who notified him of the demolitions "made it very clear to me that this was revenge for what took place in Netanya." A bombing in that coastal town Sunday killed three and wounded 33.

The Israelis bulldozed three houses in the Nabul area, about 30 miles north of Jerusalem, and one in Abu Dis, three miles east of Jerusalem.

Pope appeals for war on illiteracy

GUADALAJARA, Mexico (AP)—Pope John Paul II appealed for a war on illiteracy Tuesday and asked the wealthy to forsake "some of what is theirs" to promote social justice and help the poor live a little better.

"With all my might, I invite all those who feel Christian to renew themselves in their minds and hearts and—even forsaking some of what is theirs—promote greater justice so that none can lack adequate nourishment, clothing, housing, culture and employment," the pope said.

He spoke to workers in one of the poorer districts of Guadalajara, Mexico's second largest city, 200 miles northwest of Mexico City. The pontiff came to Mexico last week to open the Third Conference of Latin American Bishops in Puebla, 75 miles south of the capital.

U.S. 1978 trade deficit undermined dollar

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States ended 1978 with a record foreign trade deficit of \$28.45 billion, a mass of red ink that undermined the dollar during most of the year.

The Commerce Department reported Tuesday that the deficit in December was \$2.04 billion, up slightly from \$1.95 billion in November. The deficit for all of 1978 topped the previous high of \$26.5 billion in 1977. And the buy-and-sell ledger finished on the minus side despite a reduction in U.S. imports of foreign oil.

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Government allows Khomeini to return

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—The government said Tuesday that Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, the architect of the Iranian uprising, could return to Iran. It gave Air France permission to fly him from his Parisian exile to an expected triumphant re-entry in his homeland.

The American Embassy meanwhile ordered U.S. government dependents out of Iran "at the earliest feasible date" after attacks on three Americans.

Millions are expected to greet the 78-year-old Khomeini when he returns, possibly Thursday, to press on home ground his campaign to oust the constitutional monarchy headed by Prime Minister Shahpour Bakhtiar and set up an Islamic republic. Khomeini orchestrated the uprising that forced Shah Mohammad Reza Pahlavi to leave the country for what many feel is permanent exile.

There was scattered violence in Tehran Tuesday but no reports of casualties. Khomeini is expected to name his

Islamic revolutionary council upon arrival and to outline his proposals for an Islamic state during a speech at the cemetery where many victims of the past year of anti-shah rioting are buried.

The Iranian announcement said Khomeini could return early today, but his spokesmen in Paris said the trip would be delayed.

Ali-Reza Nourbakhsh, a spokesman for the committee preparing Khomeini's welcome in Tehran, said the ayatollah accepted a committee suggestion to postpone his return until Thursday so the welcome could be bigger. Airport sources in Paris said Air France was awaiting written guarantees of security for the flight.

Speculation here was that the government decided to let Khomeini come back because it would be impossible to keep the vastly popular religious leader out and the airports closed for any length of time.

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


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
