

Carter admits attack on Reagan a mistake

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Jimmy Carter, criticized for running a mean re-election campaign, conceded on Wednesday that his sharp attacks on Ronald Reagan were a mistake and promised "more reticence" in the future.

In a television interview on ABC News, the president also placed part of the blame on his GOP opponent and on human nature.

Asked whether his sharp attacks on Reagan were a mistake, Carter responded:

"Yes, I will say that, but there is enough blame to go around. I think the press sometimes has failed to cover major issues. Reagan has made comments about me that were ill-advised and I have made some about him that were ill-advised. I would like to go back on the track."

The president was reminded that he has been accused of being mean, vindictive and hysterical. He replied:

"Those charges are not accurate. I think it's true that when Reagan says I

comes through and when I feel extremely deeply about a subject...it's incumbent on me to express it but I will try to do it with more reticence in the future."

Wednesday. "I want to get to the bottom of this and an investigation will proceed."

Election laws

Residency definition causes dispute

A dispute about the definition of residency given in campus election laws could result in a Student Supreme Court case, a member of the Campus Governing Council said at its meeting Tuesday.

Tom Lambeth, CGC District 20 representative, said although he had moved from his district, he still legally represented it. The CGC bylaws state a member of the council must be a resident of the district he or she represents and the election bylaws say a student lives in the residence he is listed with in the UNC Office of Records and Registration. Because Lambeth is still listed with the records office as living at his former residence, he is technically a resident of District 20.

"Technically, to answer the question, I live in my district," Lambeth said. "There is an ambiguity in the laws that needs to be looked at. It needs to be cleared up for future reference."

The council referred the question to its Rules and Judiciary Committee.

The council unanimously voted at its meeting to allocate \$204.20 to UNC's literary magazine, *Cellar Door*, to pay the organization's phone bills.

The Black Student Movement received \$6,350 to pay for the Black Arts Festival to be held the week of March 18. This year's festival will feature a Broadway On Tour show, the Arthur Hall Afro-American Dance Company, a gospel group and theatrical modeling. The CGC appropriated \$3,625 for last year's festival.

The council also approved a bill to appropriate \$687.50 to the BSM for Gospel Choir robes. Because the additional robes will cost \$1,250, the CGC offered \$562.50 in a loan repayable over two years.

In other action, the council approved the establishment of the Budget Review Committee which will study the budget

process and submit a final report to the council. The Chapel Thrill Review Committee was established to review the costs and benefits of outdoor concerts. District 9 representative Dianne Hubbard was approved as a new member of the committee. The council also approved the formation of an Election Law Review Committee to revise campus election laws.

It also voted to take \$141.66 from WXYZ's equipment and maintenance funds to increase the salaries of the station manager and the chief engineer.
