

Student vote urged

Chancellor Christopher C. Fordham and Student Body President Scott Norberg have designated this week "Campus Voter Registration Week" to encourage students to register to vote in the municipal election Nov. 3.

The main purpose of the week is to bring attention to civic duty and the responsibility of students to vote, Norberg said.

A second reason is to create more student interest and involvement in Chapel Hill and Carrboro. "There are continually things that mean a lot to the University that students don't get a chance to get involved in," Norberg said.

The issues considered by Chapel Hill and Carrboro officials this year will be of major concern to UNC students, Norberg said, citing the noise ordinance and the bus system as examples.

Norberg said the town and University had grown too far apart and that an effort should be made to make the two work more closely together. "The influence and concerns of the University are less and less listened to and acted on," he said.

Fordham said in a prepared statement that students had an interest in public affairs and that interest should be shown by taking part in the voting process.

Students may register 9 a.m.-2 p.m. Tuesday, 3-9 p.m. Wednesday and 11 a.m.-4 p.m. Thursday in the Carolina Union; 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday and noon-8 p.m. Tuesday and Thursday in the Chapel Hill Municipal Building; 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday and Friday in the Carrboro Town Hall.

Student Government has also scheduled a reception at 9 p.m. Tuesday in the Union Gallery to give students a chance to get acquainted with town officials.

The task force expressed concern with the maintenance of the public's right to be informed of the issues involving nuclear power.

"We have turned ourselves into a speaker's bureau," Lotchin said. "We tell city and county groups what we've been investigating."

The report suggested that the town government "should insist on receiving complete information from the plant ... where there is even a suspicion that public welfare may be jeopardized."

After receiving this information, individuals may make decisions concerning the health and well-being of themselves and their families, according to the report.

The task force also recommended that a "hot line" be installed between the nuclear plant and city and county governments and that volunteers monitor technological and operational activities at the facility.

Carolina Power and Light Company, owner of the plant, should bear the cost of equipment to monitor radiation levels in the area, the citizens' group said. This monitoring would be separate from the emergency team because it would be on a continuous and non-emergency basis.

News in Brief

More fighting erupts in Iran

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Fierce fighting erupted in Iran's capital Sunday, with scores left wounded as guerrillas fired rocket-propelled grenades and machine guns in some of the worst anti-Khomeini violence in months, according to reports from Tehran.

"There are clashes absolutely everywhere in central Tehran," said one resident reached by telephone by *The Associated Press* here. "There is no possible way to know how many people are involved."

The source said anti-government fighters were well organized. "They have formed themselves into commando groups, ranger-style, and they are hitting with machine guns and anti-tank rockets" described as shoulder-carried, rocket-propelled grenades, he said.

Residents said a pall of black smoke hung over a number of neighborhoods. One person reached by telephone said a gas station was blown up and that a number of buildings were set ablaze. Others said heavy street fighting was occurring a few blocks from several government ministry buildings.

Civil rights law faces debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 16-year-old civil rights law credited for encouraging hundreds of thousands of black and other minority citizens to register to vote comes up for a test in the House this week.

Debate on the 1965 Voting Rights Act that President Lyndon B. Johnson considered a benchmark of his administration will begin in the Democratic-controlled House on Wednesday.

The law now requires nine states, most of them in the South, and some cities and counties in 13 other states to get prior approval from the Justice Department for any redistricting plans and election rule changes. That provision would expire next August if not extended.

Supporters of extension say they hope to get a strong vote in the House so it will have a better chance in the Republican-controlled Senate, where a tough fight is expected.

Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Strom Thurmond of South Carolina, one of the nine states covered by the so-called pre-clearance provision, has said he would support extension only if it were expanded to cover all 50 states.

Supporters of extension say that action would effectively kill enforcement of the law because the Justice Department lacks the resources to review election changes by every state and local government in the country.

Jonestown member may be retried

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Prosecutors were deciding Sunday whether to seek a new trial, and defense lawyers said they would ask for bail for Peoples Temple member Larry Layton, whose murder-conspiracy trial ended with a hung jury.

U.S. District Judge Robert Peckham declared a mistrial Saturday after the jury said it was not possible to decide Layton's guilt or innocence in the Nov. 18, 1978, slaying of U.S. Rep. Leo Ryan of California on an airstrip in the Guyanese jungle.

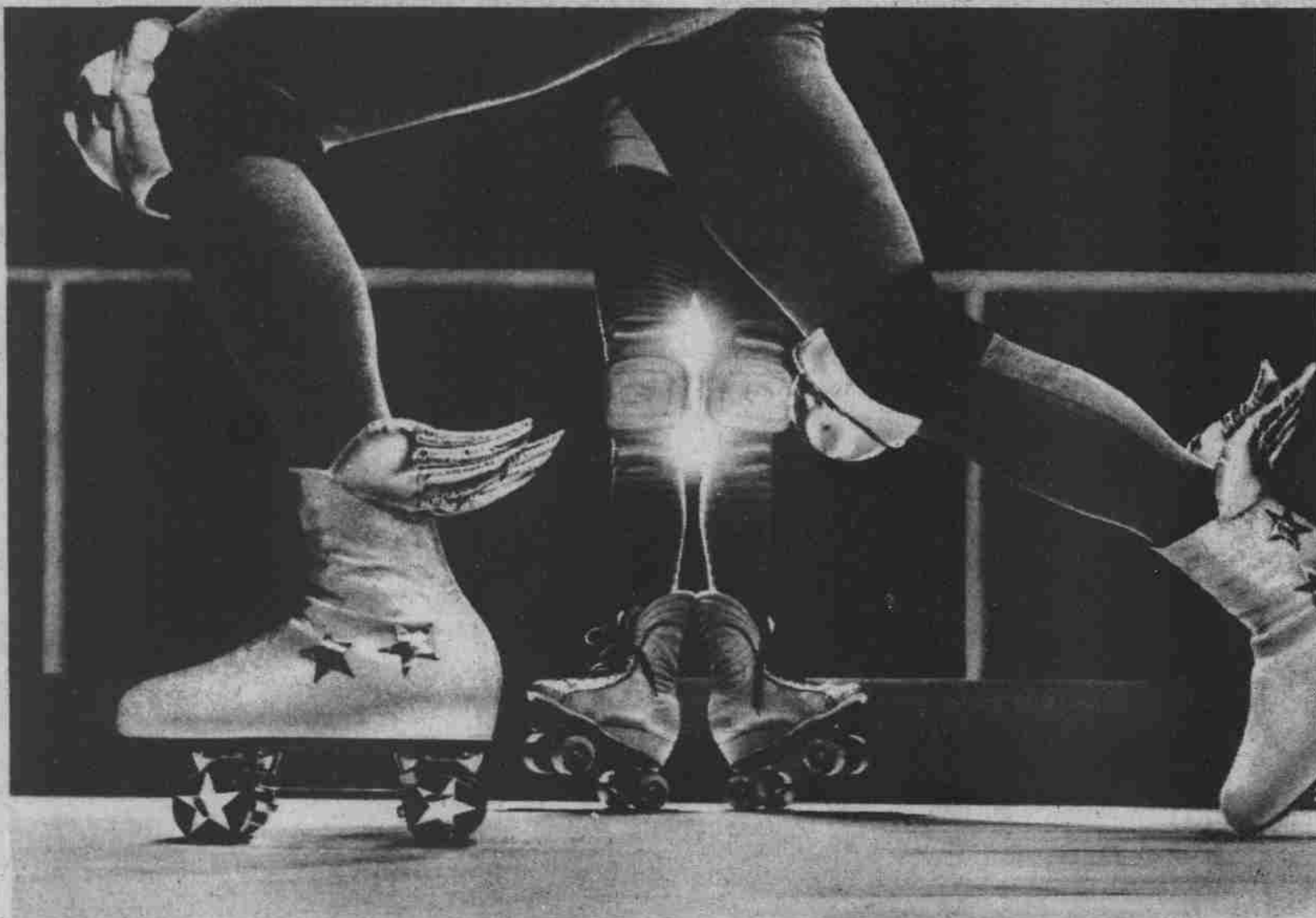
Defense attorney Tony Tamburello said he will seek to have Layton, 35, released on bail. Government attorneys refused to say whether they would retry the case.

The jury of seven women and five men had deliberated for 44 hours. Foreman Godfrey Powers said the vote was 11-1 for acquittal on charges of conspiring to murder Ryan and American diplomat Richard Dwyer, and 7-5 to convict on charges of aiding and abetting attacks on the two.

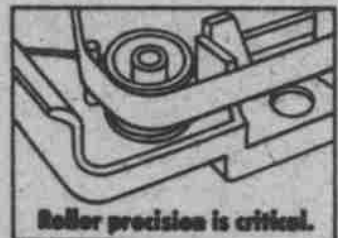
