The Jewish New Year - both joyous and serious

Happy New Year! Well, Happy Jewish New Year, that

Without the traditional singing of Auld Lang Syne, throwing of confetti and dropping of the silver ball in Times Square that many people associate with January 1, Jewish people throughout the world will be celebrating their New Year, 5742, which began at sundown Monday.

Rosh Hashana, the New Year for the Jewish people, is the celebration of the birthday of the world. Rabbi Frank A. Fischer of the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundation, a national Jewish organization with chapters at many college campuses in North Carolina, said the Jewish New Year was "a mixture of joy and seriousness."

According to a pamphlet compiled by the American Zionist Youth Foundation, Rosh Hashana is a time for remembering the past, evaluating the present and making resolutions for the future.

"Jews devote this time to personal prayer and family reunions," Fischer said.

Rosh Hashana is also known as the Day of Judgment. During this celebration, according to the AZYF pamph-

let, God records each Jew's fate for the coming year in the Book of Life. Accordingly, Jews greet each other with the traditional blessing, "May you be inscribed for a Good Year."

Along with the New Year holiday come many other symbolic traditions. Jews eat round loaves of bread to symbolize the world and the life cycle and they dip the Challah (bread) or pieces of apple in honey to represent their hope for a sweet year.

A Shofar or Ram's Horn is blown during holiday services to commemorate Abraham's sacrifice of the ram instead of his only son Isaac to God. As Fischer further explains, "These notes symbolize a covenant between man and God."

On the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashana, Jews throw bread crumbs and dust particles from their pockets into a body of water which represents a casting away of their sins from the past year.

Ten days after the beginning of the New Year, Jews observe another holiday called Yom Kippur or Day of Atonement.

These ten days between Rosh Hashana through Yom Kippur, known as the High Holidays or Days of Awe, are "the most personal and religious days in the Jewish calendar," Fischer said. "It is during this time that Jews talk most about God."

On Yom Kippur, the most sacred day of the year, Jewish people refrain from eating and drinking. Jews used this period of fasting to ask forgiveness for the sins they have committed against God and to others.

"The Yom Kippur service begins with the reciting of the Kol Nidre, a legal statement which relieves Jews of any vows made under duress, dating back to the time when Jews were forced to denounce their religion," Fischer said.

Jewish UNC students may observe Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur by attending joint UNC-Duke High Holiday Services. These student-led services will be held in Baldwin Auditorium at Duke University on Sept. 29 and 30 at 10 a.m., Oct. 7 at 6:30 p.m. and Oct. 8 at 10 a.m.

There will also be a breakfast at Duke on Oct. 7 to end officially the period of fasting.

"Synagogues are most crowded during the High Holiday season," Fischer said. "These holidays seem to establish a great sense of closeness between Jewish families and friends, and it is during Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur that Jews around the world experience religious unity through personal reflection and evaluation."

Reagan offers anti-crime proposal

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — President Ronald Reagan said Monday the answer to crime was not in "the social worker's files, the psychiatrist's notes or bureaucratic budgets." He endorsed proposals to limit bail, ease the margin for police error and set mandatory prison terms for felonies committed with guns. In his first address focusing on crime — which he called "an American epidemic" — the president outlined a program intended to overcome "a breakdown in the criminal justice system in America."

Reagan, speaking to the annual meeting of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, commended law enforcement officers as "the thin blue line that holds back a jungle that threatens to reclaim the clearing we call civilization."

Reagan embraced several of the proposals for overhauling federal criminal laws that were advanced last month by a bipartisan task force headed by Attorney General William French Smith. As the president spoke, Smith and Griffen B. Bell, attorney general under the Carter administration, testified before the Senate Judiciary Committee in behalf of that report.

The bags state the purpose of the boycott and list the targeted Nestle products, said Fronsman-Cecil.


INFACT is protesting Nestle's promotion of the use of their infant formula, which is often used instead of breastfeeding in Third World counties. However, Susan Scanlan, nutrition journalist at the Nestle Coordination Center for Nutrition, said Nestle supported the World Health Organization's code on marketing breast-milk substitutes.

"We will continue to work with other countries as they develop their own codes, and we will abide by their codes," she said.

Markham said he thought the bags would produce little negative reaction. "In fact, with all the news coverage, I can't help but think we'll get good reaction from this," he said. Markham said he did not participate in the negotiation sessions between INFACT and Lyon, but added that he did not oppose distributing the bags.

Officer admits to espionage

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Former U.S. Army Warrant Officer Joseph G. Helmich Jr. halted his spy trial by pleading guilty Monday to conspiring to sell top-secret military communication information to the Soviet Union be-

Helmich, who resigned from the Army in 1966, had pleaded innocent to a four-count espionage indictment on July 16, one day after his arrest at his home in nearby Jacksonville Beach.

Shortly before 1 p.m. EDT Monday, he approached U.S. District Judge Susan Black with his court-appointed attorney, Peter Dearing, and entered the change of plea.

Helmich admitted to only one count of the indictment, which charged him with a long-lasting conspiracy that began in 1963 when he walked into the Soviet Embassy in Paris with plans to sell U.S. military secrets.

Owners warned of 'fire-hazards'

BOSTON (AP) - Hundreds of owners of new Ford automobiles, fearing they may be denied gasoline, rushed to dealers Monday to have faulty fuel systems fixed after the Massachusetts fire marshal warned their cars were fire hazards.

The fire marshal asked local fire chiefs Monday to urge service stations to deny gas to owners of 1981 Ford Escorts and Lincoln-Mercury Lynxes unless they had had the defects repaired.

Marshal Joseph O'Keefe said a design error in 125,000 cars built between August and December last year could cause a fire when gas is being pumped into them.

"How would you like to be in a gas station waiting to be filled up, knowing that the car in front of you might blow up?" O'Keefe said in a telephone interview.

Advisers remain in El Salvador

WASHINGTON (AP) - American military advisers will remain in El Salvador for the forseeable future as that country's civilian-military junta continues its war against leftist guerrillas, a Pentagon spokesman says.

Lt. Col. Jerry Grohowski said 31 non-combat U.S. advisers are now in the Central American country, compared with 56 sent there in March when the Reagan administration vowed to "draw the line" against communist aggression in El Salvador.

The continued U.S. military presence comes despite a Defense Department statement last March that the advisers would be brought home by September. In that statement, however, the Pentagon did leave open the possibility that some others might be sent in.
