"If a young person applied for a job, I'd take the student government or *Daily Tar Heel* student who's learned to be in the administrative process and to deal with life over an 'A' student," she said. "I think you're as illiterate as the day you were born if you graduate without these experiences."

Experience in working for school groups was particularly valuable for Patterson. "The give-and-take process won't come along after college, because then it's for real," she said. "You can make a mistake in student government, but not later."

To students who might want to hold a political office someday, Patterson said, "If you don't take that first step now, probably you never will do it. Very seldom do you find someone elected later in life who wasn't involved earlier."

Patterson said she is well acquainted with Scott Norberg, last year's UNC student body president, from his work on the staff of the North Carolina 2,000 Project helping to develop an agenda for North Carolina for the next twenty years. The project is a part of Patterson's department.

Patterson said she makes every effort to bring students into government, recalling, "I gained my first opportunity to compete in useful society at Chapel Hill."

Appropriate schooling is as important as experience in getting many higher-level jobs, according to Patterson. "You'd want an MBA for

RALEIGH — North Carolina's university system is already pressed for funds and cannot absorb further budget cuts, chancellors of three schools told a legislative committee Wednesday.

The school heads described their programs, outlined their budgetary needs and efforts to cut spending and stressed education's importance to the economy.

Gov. Jim Hunt's proposed budget includes a 1.3 percent spending increase for the 16-campus university system. About 7 percent of Hunt's proposed salary increase for state employees is earmarked for UNC.

The university chancellors did not comment specifically on the Hunt budget but warned of dire consequences if their requests were cut.

BOSTON — President Reagan suggested Wednesday that the corporate income tax be abolished on grounds that it is unfair to American business and "there isn't really a

justification for it."

Reagan suggested that corporate profits simply be distributed to stockholders in the form of dividends and let those stockholders pay individual income tax on the income.

Some business leaders have suggested in the past that the present system of levying a 46 percent tax on corporate profits and taxing dividends as well amounts to double taxation of corporations.

WASHINGTON — President Reagan's sneak preview of his 1984 budget was panned Wednesday by congressional critics who want much deeper cuts in military spending.

On Wednesday, Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger met with nine senior Senate Republicans pressing the administration for further military savings, especially in strategic weapons systems.

Reagan is to submit his fiscal 1984 budget on Monday, but his broad outlines were spelled out in his nationally televised address in the House chamber Tuesday night.

a job like mine, because of its use of skills and discipline," she said. "But that's my job — administration."

She encouraged students to gain all the knowledge they could, to prepare themselves for whatever career they might want to do later. Patterson was not able to take computer science courses in college, but she learned to use computers while an assistant business manager of the psychology department at the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia.

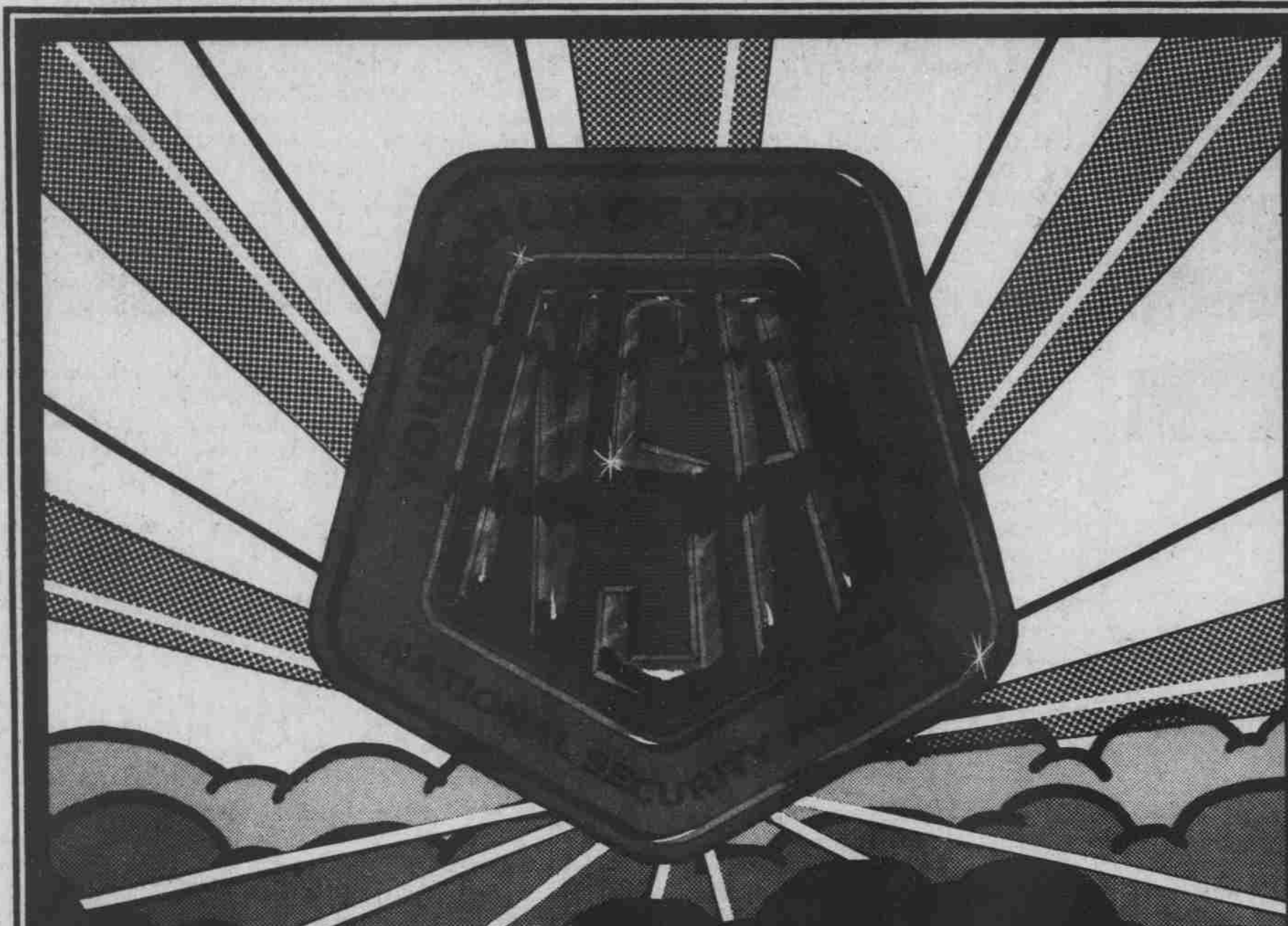
Patterson feels strongly that women and minorities should take opportunities to educate themselves well and begin careers. "I get really angry seeing women not getting involved, when others opened doors to them," she said. "I know blacks who feel the same way."

Patterson's father encouraged her to set

career goals for herself as men did. "There are still some areas we've not achieved as women — governor, university president — but as more women are getting involved, the barriers are going down," she said.

Since college, Patterson has involved herself in a great number of political activities. A few of the offices she has held are Democratic National Committee woman, 1976-80; founder, N.C. Women's Political Caucus, 1971; Guilford County Democratic Party chairwoman, 1974-77; and executive director, N.C. Civil Liberties Union, 1967-69.

"I believe it is every person's right and responsibility to get involved in their government," Patterson said. "Understanding it and working in it are the best ways to make a change."

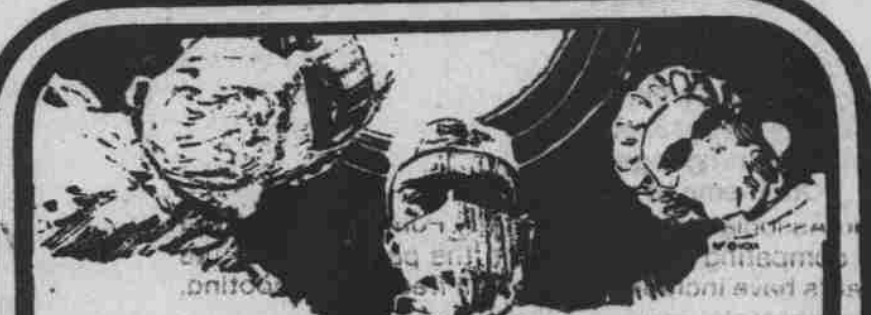
