

Professor and noted author died Saturday

Dr. Olin Terrell Mouzon, 70, professor emeritus in economics at UNC-CH died Saturday.

Mouzon, of Chapel Hill, joined the UNC faculty in 1939 and retired in 1979. He was a visiting professor at UNC in the spring of 1981.

Mouzon wrote three books and numerous articles and monographs,

mainly in the field of industrial and energy resources.

He had received his B.S. from Southern Methodist University in 1933 and his Ph.D. from UNC in 1940.

Mouzon is survived by his wife and brother.

Services were held Monday in Alderagate Methodist Church.

Man arrested after bar incident

A Durham man was arrested early Saturday morning by Chapel Hill police for attempted assault with a "death star," a sharp metal weapon which can be flung through the air.

A police report said that Wilbur Gene Miller II, 21, made several attempts to assault a Chapel Hill man with the weapon at He's Not Here bar.

After being taken to the police station, he was searched and police discovered that he was concealing a death star and brass knuckles, for which he was also charged, the report said. A .45-caliber automatic pistol also was found in his vehicle and taken by police.

Miller was turned over to the Orange County Sheriff's Department, where additional charges concerning the pistol are pending, the report said.

Stolen bank cards

Police nab local man

A Granville Towers employee was arrested by Chapel Hill police last Wednesday for attempting to obtain \$1,000 with a stolen bank card over a five-day period.

Lester Charles Vereen of 113 Creer St., a utility helper at Granville towers, was released on \$2,500 secured bond following his arrest on charges of stealing two bank credit cards — a Central Carolina Bank Master Card and a NCNB Master Card — and using the CCB card to fraudulently obtain money.

Detective Barry Thompson said the two cards and a slip of paper with the access code for the CCB card were stolen from a purse at 208 Berryhill Hall on Feb. 10. The cards belonged to Margaret Cooper, a technologist at the UNC School of Medicine.

Employees at CCB noticed that large cash withdrawals had been made with the stolen card from Feb. 10-14, and they advised Chapel Hill police that a card had been used five times in five days to obtain a total of \$1,000.

Thompson said a police officer on

patrol observed Vereen, who was being watched because of erratic behavior, attempt to use the CCB banking machine at University Mall on Feb. 15. The bank machine kept the card because there was a \$1,000 credit limit on her CCB account, Cooper said.

Police, who later made a connection between the large amounts of money withdrawn from a CCB account and the attempted use of the CCB machine, contacted Cooper. Cooper verified that her card was missing. Police arrested Vereen the following afternoon.

Cooper said that she did not know her card was stolen until police contacted her. On the day her cards were stolen, she had heard about money being taken from an employee's purse in Berryhill Hall, she said. When she checked her purse, no money was missing, and she assumed nothing was missing.

She said that she did not think her access code was in her purse, and she had no idea how someone could have used her card.

"I usually try to be very careful with my (access) numbers," she said.
