Attacks also were reported against Lebanese army positions on the mountain ridgeline above the U.S. Marine camp, and government-run television said one Lebanese soldier was killed by artillery fire from posi-

tions held by Druse militiamen. Renewed fighting was reporting in the Kharoub region, just above the Israeli defense line along southern Lebanon's Awali River, where Christian and Druse militiamen have been fighting for days.

In southern Lebanon, Israeli occupation troops fired at a hostile crowd after a confrontation with Shiite Moslems at a religious festival in the city of Nabatiyeh. Lebanese state radio said seven people were wounded. The Israeli military command in Tel Aviv said none of its soldiers had wounded any Lebanese, and an inmosphere of panic when the religious ceremony was in-

An unconfirmed report said one of the injured

Lebanese died later of his wounds There were conflicting reports on how the Nabatiyeh confrontation started, but reporters in the city said Shiites threw rocks and set two Israeli vehicles ablaze

when soldiers tried to clear a path to let a convoy pass. The Israeli military command said a hand grenade was thrown at the convoy and soldiers fired in the direction from which it was thrown. The command at first said some civilians were hit but later announced that an

investigation determined the Israelis' shots hit no one. Nabatiyeh is part of Israeli-occupied southern Lebanon, which the Israelis have controlled since invading Lebanon June 1982 in a drive against Palestinian

something underhanded." Crenshaw said Southern Bell had sent letters to all of its on-campus customers to explain that it had not been Southern Bell's intention to mislead them, and that a copy of the letter in the form of an advertisement would

appear in The Daily Tar Heel. Crenshaw said that Stamey is also investigating the possibility that an employee of Southern Bell could be responsible for adding unrequested services to student's

He said he could see no possible reason for a typist or a sales representative to indicate that someone had re-

quested a service when they actually had not. "They are not on commission," Crenshaw said. "They are ap-

praised, but their salaries are not linked to that because of contracts with the union." Crenshaw said that some salaries were fixed on the basis of sales results, but that "to add it to someone's account without even talking to them is just so blatant."

"The risk is too great," he said. "Someone could lose a job for that, regardless of what level." "Mr. Stamey will will find out what happened," Crenshaw said. "If it was an individual, appropriate ac-

Crenshaw said that typographical errors were another possible explanation for the addition of services to accounts without authorization. WASHINGTON-President Reagan has decided to appoint Robert McFarlane, his special Middle East envoy, to be his national security adviser, filling the post being vacated when William Clark becomes secretary of the interior. White House officials said Sunday.

Reagan was not expected to announce his decision until today at the

One official, speaking on the condition that he not be identified by name, said the president's key foreign policy and national security advisers had been notified of the president's decision, reached during the weekend.

"All that remains is the president making it formal," said another official.

The officials said that Reagan had not taken the final step of actually offering the job to McFarlane, who, in addition to the Middle East job, is the deputy national security adviser. .

WASHINGTON-President Reagan's policies in Central America face another congressional test this week as the Democratically controlled House votes on efforts to cut off all covert aid to anti-communist rebels in Nicaragua.

The vote will measure whether attitudes toward U.S. support for opponents of the Sandinista government in Nicaragua have changed since Korean Air Lines Flight 007 was shot down by the Soviet Union last month.

Sources said House leaders deliberately held off votes on the funding cutoff until the initial furor over the Korean plan had abated. Congress returns this week after a long Columbus Day holiday recess.

In a bitter, emotional battle, reminiscent of the Vietnam War years, the House voted 228-195 on July 27 to cease about \$19 million in secret CIA support for an estimated 11,000 "contras" seeking overthrow of the Nicaraguan government.

JUELICH, West Germany-Twentythousand protesters jammed this Rhineland town and 4,000 marched in West Berlin on Sunday to pray for peace and denounce the deployment of new U.S. nuclear missiles in

The Rhineland protesters, including many elderly people, rode scores of chartered buses to Juelich for a prayer service organized by the Evangelical Church as part of the nationwide "peace week."

The prayer program said the goal was to present "a clear no" to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's plans to deploy 572 U.S.-built missiles in Western Europe starting next month to counter a Soviet buildup of SS-20 missiles already in place.

RALEIGH, N.C.-When Lt. Gov. Jimmy Green begins his trial today on bribery and conspiracy charges, the focus may be as much on cameras in the courtroom as on Green.

Green is the first North Carolina lieutenant governor to be tried on criminal charges since the office was first in the state to be filmed and

established in 1868. And his trial is the photographed in the courtroom. The trial will be a test of news organizations' contentions that

cameras can be used in the courtroom. Green, 62, was indicted June 20 for allegedly accepting a \$2,000 bribe, consenting to receive a \$2,000 bribe, conspiring to receive a bribe and twice consenting to receive bribes of \$10,000 a month. He has pleaded innocent to all charges.


