

Young Democrats question state attorney general hopefuls

Two Democratic candidates for N.C. attorney general responded to questions from members of the UNC Young Democrats in a forum Tuesday night in the Carolina Union.

Lacy Thornburg, a former Superior Court judge from Sylva, and District Attorney Howard Boney from Edgecombe County each gave their views on such topics as drug smuggling, the state's prison system and the environment. Both candidates are graduates of the UNC School of Law.

Young Democrats president Harry Kaplan, who moderated the forum, asked the candidates about the N.C. prison system and alternative sentencing.

"In sentencing, we've got to say to the criminal, 'What are you going to do for us?'" Boney said. "What's important is swiftness of punishment. If there's a solution, it rests in society."

Thornburg said the state should make good use of alter-

native sentencing programs. "A lot of the prison population is made up of people who write bad checks," he said. Both candidates stressed the importance of protecting the environment.

"The state has no meaningful environmental legislation," Thornburg said. "The attorney general needs to provide leadership to make laws, then enforce them."

Boney proposed creating a staff within the attorney general's office to advocate environmental policy. "Until that occurs, I think the attorney general needs to work with DAs, groups and law enforcement to conduct public forums and publicity."

Another issue of statewide concern has been drug smuggling. "In all the years that I sat on the bench, I don't think I tried over two or three major drug dealers," Thornburg said. "Most were small dealers. The attorney general can coordinate local, state and federal agencies in combating the flow of drugs."

Boney said the state should address drug trafficking as "a crime problem."

"First, we ought to commit resources to stopping them (drug dealers) at waterways and airways," he said. "But it's going to take a comprehensive program nationwide to really stop them."

And both candidates had their opinions on state and federal investigations into political corruption in North Carolina.

"I don't believe in politically motivated investigations," Boney said of the recent probes into wrongdoing among public officials in the state. "I don't think we get the benefit or kind of equal justice in our federal system that we have in our state system."

Thornburg said he didn't feel it was necessary for the FBI to do the work of state investigators. "It is the duty of local investigators and the SBI (State Bureau of Investigation), and they are capable and ought to do the investigating."

Another candidate for attorney general, former U.S. Attorney H.M. "Mickey" Michaux, was invited to the forum, but was not present.

Despite national glut, law schools graduate 40,000 a year

Despite the much-publicized glut of lawyers nationwide, law schools continue to graduate about 40,000 lawyers annually.

Giles Kennedy, director of admissions at the University of Georgia School of

Law, said applications to Georgia were down about 5 percent last year from previous years. The number of students applying to law schools nationwide dropped to 70,000 in 1982-83 from about 72,000 the previous year, he said.

But economics did not play much of a factor in overall applications, Kennedy said. "The number of applicants had

been increasing slowly over the years, but law school administrators had expected that number to drop slightly and level off," he said.

"I think this may be what we are seeing happen now," he said.

"The only role economics is playing is in causing people to turn to state law schools as opposed to private institutions," he said. "Last year Harvard experienced a drop in applications from 7,400 to 6,200."

Kennedy was one of 15 law school representatives at a law school forum Wednesday in Great Hall that was co-sponsored by the Pre-Law Club and University Career Planning and Placement Services.

"The purpose of the forum was to draw a number of law schools together at one time for students to obtain information in an informal setting on different aspects of the schools," said Larry

Raines, president of the Pre-Law Club.

Lisa Dam, a senior Spanish major, said, "I think it is a great opportunity to learn more substantial information about a school than you can obtain from a catalog."

Having so many law schools represented at one time made it easier than sending out for information and helps getting applications in, she said.

Jane DiFolco, from the law school admissions office at Emory University, said student turnout had been steady throughout the day.

Representatives said students were most concerned with admissions standards, procedures and finances.

"Students are becoming more sophisticated," said Thomas Trujillo, dean of admissions at the UNC School of Law.

State and Nation

WASHINGTON — Top network representatives Wednesday assailed a ban on news coverage of the U.S. invasion of Grenada, with a CBS executive calling the policy "the dawn of a new era of censorship."

CBS News President Edward Joyce told Congress the Reagan administration resorted to "unprecedented censorship" and "introduced a new relationship with the press, a relationship virtually unknown in U.S. history."

Testifying before a House Judiciary subcommittee, Joyce said journalists posed no threat to the security of the invasion or the lives of U.S. troops. His view was shared by senior commentator John Chancellor of NBC, and ABC senior correspondent David Brinkley.

"I am seriously concerned that we may indeed be witnessing the dawn of a new era of censorship, of manipulation of the press, of considering the media the handmaidens of government to spoon-feed the public with government-approved information," Joyce said.

The invasion began at dawn on Oct. 25, and reporters were given escorted tours two days later. On Sunday, reporters were permitted to cover the invasion unescorted.

UNITED NATIONS — The General Assembly adopted a resolution Wednesday calling for withdrawal of foreign troops from Grenada. The vote was 108-9 with 27 abstentions.

Those opposed included the United States and some of the other Caribbean countries joining it in the Oct. 25 inva-

sion of Grenada that ousted a Marxist military junta that took over after the assassination of Prime Minister Maurice Bishop.

WASHINGTON — With Martin Luther King's widow at his side, President Reagan on Wednesday signed legislation he once opposed that honors the slain civil rights leader with a national holiday each year. Reagan said King had "stirred our nation to the very depths of its soul" in battling racial discrimination.

Congressional leaders and veterans of the civil rights movement, including Jesse Jackson, the Rev. Ralph Abernathy, and Atlanta Mayor Andrew Young, filled the Rose Garden for the signing ceremony.

The proceedings climaxed as the crowd softly sang, "We Shall Overcome" — the anthem of King's non-violent crusade against segregation.

His widow, Coretta Scott King, told the crowd, "America is a more democratic nation, a more just nation, a more peaceful nation because Martin Luther King became her pre-eminent non-violent commander."

While saying the nation had made huge strides in civil rights, Reagan declared, "traces of bigotry still mar America."

RALEIGH — Gov. Jim Hunt said Wednesday he has learned of new environmental threats that could be posed by a water pipeline to Virginia, including increased pollution of the Albemarle Sound.

Hunt said the 85-mile pipeline from Lake Gaston to Virginia Beach also poses environmental threats to Virginia counties near the lake. He said he learned of the potential problems at a meeting Wednesday in Roanoke Rapids with government officials, civic leaders and citizens.
