

# 73-year-old Reagan celebrates his birthday

WASHINGTON — Ronald Reagan, celebrating his 73rd birthday today, has one way to deal with any hint of a suggestion that he is too old to be president of the United States: laugh about his age.

Tell jokes, make wisecracks, and even write a magazine article about his own physical exercise routine. Chop wood and talk about chopping wood. He's done it all, and his aides feel he has completely deflected any concern that his age should be a factor in voters' decisions in November.

To a gathering of administration appointees on the third anniversary of his inauguration, Reagan praised the 185-year-old Marine Band and Drum and Bugle Corps: "You'll never hear me criticizing any organization that's as old as the Marine Corps." The crowd laughed.

Moments later, introducing Margaret Heckler, the secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services, he said:

"By the way, I just noticed that HHS has announced that there have been new gains in life expectancy for Americans. I'm happy about that." More laughter.

"I've already lived about 20-odd years longer than my life expectancy when I was born. That's a source of annoyance to a number of people," he added. Laughter again.

And, according to the National Center for Health Statistics, the average 73-year-old white male American can expect to live another 9.9 years, or nearly to the age of 83. If Reagan is re-elected, he would be 16 days short of 78 years old when leaving office.

At every opportunity, Reagan demonstrates his vitality. Walking to a waiting helicopter on the White House lawn last week, he came upon a lump of snow and playfully kicked it into the air. He chased a piece that broke off and kicked it again.

His doctor says there were no lasting impairments as a result of the gunshot wound he suffered in an assassination attempt on March 30, 1981.

Reagan has long suffered from allergies, a form of hay fever, and he receives periodic desensitization shots to control the symptoms. *The New York Times* said Sunday that Reagan is allergic to some of the stuffed antique relics in the White House.

The president has a chronic hearing problem, which has gotten worse. He wears a hearing aid in his right ear. He also wears contact lenses. But, given a good night's rest, the ruddy-faced president, whose hair now shows flecks of gray, is a 6-foot-1, 190-pound portrait of good health.

On April 1, 1982, he underwent a urological examination at the Bethesda Naval Medical Center, and all test results were normal. The exam was prompted by urinary tract discomfort, which disappeared after treatment with antibiotics, White House representative Larry Speakes said.

Reagan had undergone surgery in 1967, when he was governor of California, to remove calcium deposits in the urinary tract.

A general medical evaluation completed more than two years ago found no evidence of cardiac disease or any malignancies. The exam found colonic diverticula — small, common abnormalities in the colon that can in some cases cause considerable pain but in Reagan's case have produced no symptoms.

army was beginning to split apart along factional lines, as it did in the 1975-76 civil war. About 60 percent of the army is Moslem, and Shiites make up the largest single group of enlisted men. Most of the officers are Christians. About 1,000 of the 1,500 Druse in the 37,000-man army have defected since the September fighting, unwilling to fight against Druse militiamen in their battles with the army.

A cameraman for the British Broadcasting Corp., Richard Hill, suffered a minor head wound on Sunday while on assignment in Beirut's southern suburbs, his colleagues said. Two French members of the multinational force were injured in cross fire Saturday, a French military representative said Sunday.

In southern Lebanon, Israeli troops were attacked twice by small arms fire, the Israeli military command said. One Israeli soldier was wounded.

Lebanese army representative Maj. Michel Lehouc denied there had been any defections from the army following Berri's call to Moslem soldiers to lay down their arms. Berri said Saturday that two brigades had defected.

Police said 12 people were killed, bringing the casualty toll to 70 dead and more than 250 wounded in four days of fighting.

Army units at the Galerie Semaan entrance to Beirut, about two miles east of the airport road, exchanged heavy barrages of tank, artillery and small arms fire with Amal forces.

The army moved forward several hundred yards Saturday night, taking back positions captured by Amal last Thursday. But the battle around St. Michael's church on the Galerie Semaan road appeared stalemated Sunday.

Shiite Moslems, who make up a large portion of the population of the Israeli-occupied south, have been blamed by Israeli officials for many of the almost daily attacks in recent months in southern Lebanon.

A 610-man French contingent took up new positions with the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon on Sunday along the Israeli border.

## Information session to be held on anorexia nervosa, bulimia

My roommate is obsessed with the idea that she is overweight even though she appears to be too thin.

What should I do if my sister is throwing up after meals?

Every time I eat, I feel like I am gaining 20 pounds.

These topics are among those that will be discussed during an information session on anorexia nervosa and bulimia sponsored by the Mental

Health Association and the Women's Center of Orange County. Sibyl Wagner, a social worker who specializes in helping people with eating disorders, and Ludie White, a graduate student in the School of Social Work and former president of the N.C. Mental Health Association, will lead the session.

Wagner said bulimia was characterized by binge eating that is often

done in secret. Victims of bulimia may vomit after eating, use laxatives and diuretics excessively, or even starve themselves, she said.

Anorexia may or may not be associated with bulimia, Wagner said.

She said anorexia was characterized by significant weight loss not due to any known physical disorders, cessation of menstruation in females, a distinct fear of obesity that does not lessen as the person loses weight, and a distorted body image.

The exact number of bulimic and anorexic cases are not known because many cases are not diagnosed,

Wagner said. But she said bulimia is thought to occur in 20 percent to 30 percent of college age women while Anorexia occurs in 1 percent of women in this age group. Wagner said anorexia occurs less often because it requires self-control versus what the body wants.

Wagner said she became interested in teaching about eating disorders while she was a psychology major in college. At that time, information about eating disorders was rarely published, she said.

"I am dedicating my campaign to that vision of America, and here today with you, my friends and neighbors, I declare my candidacy for the United States Senate," Hunt said. The crowd applauded for 32 seconds while one of the bands played "Happy Days are Here Again," the traditional battle tune of the Democratic Party.

"I know what America can do, because I know what North Carolina has done," he said. "I know America can build an economy that gives us steady, sustained growth; not a roller-coaster ride from recession to inflation to unemployment and back again. I know because we have done it in North Carolina — 200,000 new manufacturing jobs since 1977 — \$13 billion worth of new industry. North Carolina is leading the way!"

"I know we can balance the budget in Washington, because I have balanced North Carolina's budget every single year," Hunt said. "I know when to spend and when to cut. I know how to say yes to the people's interests and to say no to the special interests."

Hunt also pledged support for the elderly, the family farmer, civil and equal rights, better education, a clean environment and a strong America. "We need an America where our military strength matches our commitments around the world, an America that is a force for freedom, and an America that has the courage to put tough negotiators across the table from

**WASHINGTON — Action on U.S. involvement in El Salvador and Lebanon, including a non-binding resolution urging withdrawal of U.S. Peacekeeping troops from Beirut, occupies Congress' attention** this week as lawmakers drive toward a mid-month recess.

The House is to consider on Tuesday a measure that would reinstate a requirement, first enacted in 1981, that President Reagan certify each six months that the Salvadoran government is making progress in human rights as a condition of continued aid to the Central American country.

Congress approved such a requirement late last year, but Reagan vetoed the measure after lawmakers began their long Christmas recess.

**WASHINGTON — Most North Carolina congressmen seeking re-election this year** have so far received donations from the country's special interest political action committees, *The News and Observer* of Raleigh reported Sunday.

With the exception of one House member, campaign finance reports filed with the Federal Election Commission showed that about 70 percent of the money raised by North Carolina incumbents in the last six months of 1983 came from PACs.

Most donations came from Washington-based PACs representing interests from sugar growers to labor unions.

As of Friday, the state's leading PAC-money-raiser was Rep. Walter B. Jones of Farmville, the delegation's senior Democrat.

**CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — The Westar VI satellite that failed to get into a 22,300-mile-high orbit** after being lost from the space shuttle Challenger was found Sunday, "completely healthy" but in the wrong orbit.

A ground station in California succeeded in changing the satellite's attitude so that its batteries could charge from the sun's energy, said Bill Ziegler, a representative for Western Union, which owns Westar VI.

Ziegler said, however, that there was no hope of raising the satellite to

**Soviets and find a way to stop the nuclear arms race,"** Hunt said.

Former U.S. congressman and federal judge Richardson Preyer said Hunt would represent North Carolina to the world as senator. "Jim Hunt is our kind of people," Preyer said. Preyer is serving as co-chairman on the Jim Hunt Committee and is a part-time political science professor at UNC.

Phil Carlton, a former N.C. Supreme Court justice and special counsel to the Jim Hunt Committee, told the crowd that some people like to ask where Jim Hunt stands — indirectly referring to recent television commercials by Helms in which the senator asks, "Where do you stand, Jim?" on certain national issues.

"North Carolina knows where Jim Hunt stands," Carlton said. "And we will be proud in January of 1985 when he stands on the floor of the United States Senate and takes the oath of office as the senator who makes North Carolina proud again."

Following the announcement, about 2,000 people attended a campaign rally at the Wilson Recreation Center for a \$5-a-plate barbecue dinner and campaign rally. Hunt told supporters to work hard at the grassroots level to win the primary and to win in the general election.

Roy L. Champion, Chairman of the Wilson County Board of Commissioners, proclaimed Feb. 4 as Jim Hunt day in Wilson County.
