Bragg said an important thing to remember after being closed out is not to panic.

The first thing students should do in beginning their apartment hunt, is pick up a housing guide and read it, especially the legal section, she said. "It should give them a pretty good sense of everything."

The guide will be available on campus and in the SCAU office in the Union.

Transportation must be considered in choosing an apartment complex, Bragg said. Is the complex close enough to walk to campus, or is it on a bus route?

Other considerations include whether the apartments are furnished. Also, the student must take into account hidden off-campus living costs such as utilities, Bragg said.

"Talk to the manager and the tenants if an

apartment really interests you," Bragg said. "If you decide on an apartment, before signing the lease, take time to read it." Reading the legal section of the guide is especially good in helping you understand the lease, she said.


Bragg also said students should be careful in choosing their roommates. SCAU offers a roommate referral service, in which students can fill out a form with SCAU and have it

placed in a computer to help find a compatible roommate, she said.

Apartments are not the only options for students closed out of the dorms, Bragg said. Alternatives include mobile homes. There are several mobile homes parks in the area. Also, many rooms, homes and mobile homes are available for rent.

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Druze and Moslem rebel leaders returning from Syria vowed Monday to press their campaign for the ouster of Christian President Amin Gemayel, while army and militia forces dueling with machine guns and grenades in the capital's devastated commercial district.

Italy pulled its peacekeeping forces out of Beirut, and an American source said the U.S. Marines would be out of their airport base by next week.

Saudi Arabia, which is trying to mediate a settlement of the bitter differences between Gemayel and his Syrian-backed opposition, sent crown Prince Abdullah bin Abdulaziz and the Saudi ambassador to the United States, Prince Bandar, to Damascus for talks with Syrian President Hafez Assad.

CHICAGO — Illinois and Cook County will pay more than \$15 million to hundreds of current or former black welfare workers in what their union said Monday may be the largest racial discrimination award of its kind in U.S. history.

The award, announced at a news conference, stems from a 1973 lawsuit by the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees. The suit charged that many black public aid workers performed the

same tasks as whites but earned from \$150 to \$300 a month less. At least 1,000 people will share the award.

"Their day is at hand," said Max Liberles, president of AFSCME Local 2000. "They will finally be getting these large sums of money they rightfully deserve."

RALEIGH — Raleigh and Wake County officials say they are reluctant to approve a room tax to promote tourism, despite similar moves by other resort areas in the state.

The Greater Raleigh Chamber of Commerce and the Raleigh Hotel-Motel Association are urging local politicians to back a 2 percent room tax to establish a tourism authority to attract tourists, businessmen and conventions.

The room tax would need approval by both the Raleigh city council and Wake County commissioners before local legislators would take it to the Legislature.

MONROE, N.C. — H.R. Johnson has been getting a lot of attention when he takes to the golf course lately, but not because of a grooved swing, booming drives or holes in one.

Other golfers have been stopping and staring at Johnson's new caddy — a 3-year-old dog.

Johnson taught "Superdog" to caddy in only one afternoon, less than it often takes to train a human companion.

The dog was supposed to be a wedding present from another relative to Johnson's son. But Johnson took a liking to the mutt, and about a week ago decided to teach him to caddy.
