"We can swear up and down that we're not making a prediction, but everyone judges us as if we are making a prediction," he said.

The Carolina Poll has only been in business during elections since 1976, Meyer said. He added that during the 1976 Senate race, in which the poll found Helms to be ahead of Democratic opponent John Ingram, Helms said he was gratified by the poll's findings. Bass said the Hunt campaign had no problems with the Carolina Poll.

"I think that is has been a useful poll," Bass said. "Whenever you're down in the polls, it's always easy to discredit them."

Allen said he didn't want to appear too harsh toward the Carolina Poll.

"I'm not trying to tear down the Carolina Poll, because it is students learning about polling," he said. For the latest Carolina Poll, the sample size has been increased from 600 to 1,200 according to Meyer. Although Hunt has been ahead of or even with Helms in all polls conducted thus far, Allen said Hunt's current standing was misleading.

"From what I understand, the governor is not in a very comfortable position right now," Allen said. "Sen. Helms has never been as close as he is now this early in a race."

Bass, however, said she felt very good about Hunt's position, especially since his campaign ads only began running two weeks ago.

The main thing all the polls show is the closeness of the Senate race, Allen said.

"Polls will come out showing us up and showing us down," he said. "It probably will continue to be very


In the runoff for the Campus Governing Council seat in District 1, Doug Berger defeated Steve Reinhard, 122-109. In the runoff in the seat for District 6, John D. Reed defeated Beth McPherson, 39-19. Elections Board Chairman Andy Sutherland said he was surprised by the high turnout for the runoffs. Board member Stephen Ruscus attributed the turnout to intense door-to-door campaigning by the candidates.

Sutherland said he received no reports of irregularities in the runoff balloting. The polls ran smoothly because polltenders were better informed of their duties by the board, he said.

BEIRUT, Lebanon - U.S. Navy helicopters ferried Marine combat troops from their base at Beirut's airport to warships in the Mediterranean on Tuesday as the Marine withdrawal from Beirut officially got under way. Israeli jets, meanwhile, bombed and

strafed positions in the Syriancontrolled mountains east of the capital.

Helicopters flew in from the 6th Fleet shortly after dawn Tuesday and the withdrawal of the estimated 1,300 shore-based Marines began an hour later, Marine spokesman Maj. Dennis Brooks said.

Brooks said he could not say how many Marines were withdrawn Tuesday. He estimated it would take "approximately a week, maybe two" to evacuate the base at Beirut's airport,

"We do not accept democracy that is ordered by the U.S. government," · said Daniel Ortega, coordinator of the governing junta, in an apparent reference to Reagan administration pressure for open elections in Nicaragua.

Nov. 4 is two days before the U.S. presidential election.

Opposition parties say they will boycott the elections unless the government lifts the state of emergency and press censorship, respects human rights and cuts links between the official party - the Sandinista National Liberation Front - and government security forces.

Taking no time out to celebrate their Iowa victories, Walter F. Mondale and Gary Hart turned their attention on Tuesday to New Hampshire and the next big events on the Democratic presidential circuit.

Hart's second-place finish in Iowa gives his campaign new life, if for no other reason than the increased attention it will bring him.
