

**MOSCOW — Soviet authorities refused Tuesday to allow the U.S. ambassador to make a televised Fourth of July speech calling for U.S.-Soviet cooperation "without preconditions," the U.S. Embassy said.**

It was the first the Soviets had scuttled the traditional speech without first seeking revisions in the text, according to a U.S. Embassy spokesman who spoke on condition he not be identified.

In Washington, State Department spokesman John Hughes said the Soviets offered the explanation that the speech did not fit into their programming schedule. Hughes called that a "lame excuse."

In his prepared remarks, Ambassador Arthur Hartman addressed U.S. readiness to reach an agreement reducing nuclear arms and said President Reagan was prepared to meet with Soviet leader Konstantin U. Chernenko.

Hartman also extolled American civil liberties and praised the U.S. electoral system in the speech, which he was to have delivered during the nationally televised evening news Wednesday.

While the ambassador's address made no direct criticism of the Soviet Union, it did use specific phrases often employed by the Soviets to attack U.S. foreign policy. Such phrases were deleted from official Soviet versions of a speech this week by British Foreign Secretary Geoffrey Howe.

Hartman said "the national consensus for peace is strong" adding "the situation today in

Soviet-American relations shows clearly that understanding between our two countries needs to be strengthened."

He said, "This requires not only words but concrete deeds. The United States seeks cooperation with the Soviet Union without preconditions. Our president is prepared to meet and discuss these issues. We want agreements to reduce nuclear arms and to lessen the threat of war. We believe that understanding can be built through open, frank dialogue and expanded contact."

**NEW YORK — Sen. Gary Hart, still insisting that he will be the Democratic presidential nominee, says he would oppose a convention floor fight to put a woman on the Democratic ticket.**

"I don't think that any particular group, including this group, ought to be dictating to the party or the nominee what it can and cannot do," Hart said Monday after a speech at Columbia University.

Members of the National Organization for Women have recommended that a woman vice-presidential candidate be nominated from the convention floor if Walter F. Mondale picks a man for the No. 2 spot.

Hart declined to say whether he would take the second spot on a Mondale ticket, and still insisted that he intended to head a Hart ticket.

"I intend to be the nominee," he said. "The question is whether Mr. Mondale would like another

term as vice president."

Hart used his speech to attack the federal budget deficits approaching \$200 billion and said President Reagan "can't run in 1984 on anything but red ink."

**BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — No one recognized the Jehovah's Witness missionary who knocked at several suburban doors, distributing literature — but a limousine service owner says it was none other than the singing phenomenon Michael Jackson in disguise.**

Wearing a gray suit and a drooping, bushy mustache — and leaving his trademark sequined glove back at the hotel — Jackson reportedly made the rounds Sunday during his stay in Birmingham to rehearse for his upcoming concert tour with his brothers.

Cliff Muldrow, head of Jackson's limousine service, told The Birmingham News he took Jackson to the Jehovah's Witness church in Center Point, a Birmingham suburb, and then to several homes in Trussville where he went door to door handing out church literature.

**WASHINGTON — The Defense Department plans to send a plane to Hanoi on July 17 to pick up the remains of eight men believed by the Vietnamese to be those of American servicemen killed in the Southeast Asia war.**

The Pentagon said Tuesday, in response to inquiries, that "the Vietnamese have informed us that they plan to turn over eight remains to the U.S. government on July 17. We are making the necessary arrangements to receive these remains in Hanoi."

The statement carefully avoided describing the remains as those of Americans. It said they will be examined by U.S. experts at a government laboratory in Hawaii "for identification and subsequent return to the next of kin."

So far in the 11 years since the end of U.S. involvement in the Southeast Asia war, the Vietnamese have returned 88 sets of remains. The Pentagon still lists 2,489 men, virtually all pilots and other airmen, as unaccounted for.

The slow pace of Vietnam's return of American remains has been a sore point between the two former enemies and is believed to be partly responsible for impeding the normalization of relations.

Early in May, Vietnamese Prime Minister Pham Van Dong said in a Newsweek magazine interview that his government would turn over the remains of eight Americans later that month. He denied there are any Americans still alive in his country and said that "anyone who believes so is daydreaming."

Earlier this week, a senior Vietnamese official told reporters in Phnom Penh, Cambodia, that continuing U.S. unfriendliness

toward Vietnam had hurt Hanoi's efforts to get villagers to cooperate in searching for missing Americans.

This official, who spoke only on the condition that he not be identified, blamed this reluctance on memories of deaths among the civilian population as the result of U.S. bombing.

**BELLEVILLE — Ill., Saying a free press is essential to democracy, an editorial writer went to jail Tuesday to serve an indefinite contempt sentence for refusing to divulge his sources in an editorial that led to a libel suit.**

"If I don't, I'm afraid no one will challenge this law and it won't get changed," said Richard Hargraves, 34. "If I don't challenge this terrible law, any time a politician doesn't like something said about him, he can file a libel suit and ask for the sources."

The editorial writer, appearing in handcuffs before Judge Roger M. Scrivner this morning, repeated his refusal to reveal his sources and was ordered by Scrivner to the St. Clair County Jail.

Hargraves worked for the Belleville News-Democrat when he wrote the editorial involving a county supervisor in 1981. Hargraves now is an editorial writer for the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, across the Mississippi River from Belleville.
