

Hunt's campaign renews attack on Helms

Gov. Jim Hunt's campaign for U.S. Senate renewed yesterday its assault on Sen. Jesse Helms as a foe of Social Security, unveiling a television commercial on the matter and accusing the Republican of trying to conceal his stand.

Claude Allen, spokesman for the Helms for Senate Committee, said Hunt was distorting Helms' record and playing a "cruel hoax" on the elderly.

Gary Pearce, co-chairman of the Hunt campaign, displayed during a news conference copies of letters written by Helms and George Hess of Raleigh, a retired Social Security official. Helms' letter is to Hess, asking him to "spread the word" that Helms doesn't

favor cutting Social Security. Hess' letter, bearing that message, is addressed to the state's "concerned citizens."

Pearce called the letters "incredible" and "a glaring example of political doubletalk by Senator Helms."

"You can't wage a 20-year crusade against Social Security — as Jesse Helms has — and then, in an election year, pose as the Senate's leading defender of Social Security," said Pearce.

"Time after time, when he had a chance to stand up for Social Security, Jesse Helms went down to the Senate floor and voted to cut the benefits that our parents and our grandparents have earned."

Allen said in a telephone interview that the letters were authentic. Hess' letter was mailed to "several thousand" people statewide around mid-August, he said.

"It's just a cruel hoax to play on senior citizens for Governor Hunt to come out in this campaign once again and try to scare them," said Allen. "What we see is Hunt and other liberal politicians demagoguing the issue, just as national Democratic strategist Peter Hart said they would do to frighten them to the polls."

The letter from Helms, dated Aug. 1, tells Hess that Hunt is "trying to frighten" the elderly into voting for him and "ought to be ashamed of himself."

Donovan resigns post

NEW YORK — Labor Secretary Raymond Donovan surrendered yesterday to face criminal charges of grand larceny and falsifying records while he was an executive of a New Jersey construction firm.

"It's a political hatchet job," said Donovan of the charges before entering the Criminal Courthouse in the Bronx.

Donovan announced Monday night he was taking a leave of absence to answer the accusations.

"I plan to devote all my time and attention to this matter," Donovan said of the indictment that he termed "a mindless inquisition" Monday night in a terse statement he read to reporters.

"I fully expect to resume my duties just as soon as this injustice has been dealt with," said Donovan, who has been dogged by questions about his New Jersey construction firm since before joining the administration.

He said he was leaving immediately, in part, to ensure "that this does not reflect negatively upon the president" in the current campaign.

million, but the commission approved only about a 12 percent hike.

The utility was allowed to add to its base rate nearly \$104 million for construction work in progress on the Cherokee Nuclear Station as of Dec. 31, 1980. But the state's high court said the commission was wrong to allow Duke to add \$29.6 million for funds used during construction on work done before July 1979.

The Supreme Court affirmed a state appeals court ruling that sent back the case for further findings of fact on whether there was enough evidence "as to the reasonableness of Duke's fuel costs." The Supreme Court said the utilities commission may reopen the rate hearing to consider more testimony on the fuel costs.

Drunken driving arrests down

"I think the statistics prove we are saving lives and that is what the law was designed to do," said Alamance County Chief District Judge J.B. Allen.

RALEIGH — The state Supreme Court yesterday ruled that the North Carolina Utilities Commission must cut the \$166.4 million rate hike it allowed Duke Power Co. in 1982 by \$29.6 million and order refunds.

Duke had sought a revenue increase of nearly 20 percent or \$211

He said the trend would not affect programs at the University. "I don't see (the trend) affecting curriculum at all," he said.

The continuing increase in the percentage of female students is slowing,

Boulton said. "I believe that we're seeing a leveling off. We're about where we're going to stay."

The number of women in colleges and universities will have an effect on the job market, Cannon said.

"The increase in female student enrollment nationwide is going to have an effect on the future workplace," he said. "You're going to find more women coming into the workplace."

"More and more women are going to college and they are entering the work force in greater numbers," Boulton said.

Board votes to zone Cheeks Township

The Orange County Board of Commissioners met Tuesday night to discuss, among other items on the agenda, the controversial Cheeks Township Zoning Proposal. In a split vote of 3-2, the board voted in favor of the zoning of the area.

The Cheeks Township Zoning Proposal has come under controversy recently because of the current regulations surrounding commercial and light industrial developments within the Cheeks Township area. Under the current regulations, no commercial or industrial development is allowed, and it is against the ordinance for people to live in mobile homes while there is construction of conventional homes on the same lot. People who run businesses in their homes are also not allowed to sell any products except those produced on the premises under this same ordinance.

The commissioners' vote will change these regulations so that commercial and light industrial businesses can be developed, providing they meet certain requirements, and people will be able to live in a mobile home while building a conventional home. There will also be a change in the rule so that people in home businesses can sell products that are not necessarily produced on the premises.

The extension of zoning to the Cheeks Township was first presented at

a public hearing last year for the purpose of receiving citizens' comments and concerns about the proposed recommendation. The Board of Commissioners was also presented with the proposed developmental standards of the Water Quality Critical Area. This is the proposal concerning the protection of existing and future water reservoirs.

In a Cheeks Advisory Report that has been presented to the Board of Commissioners, several proposals for the Water Quality Critical Area were suggested to allow the development of commercial and light industrial businesses. The commissioners advised the planning board to consider the report and address any concerns to the Cheeks Township Advisory Council prior to Nov. 5 when the Board of Commissioners will meet to vote on the proposal.

While the Cheeks Township zoning amendment has been surrounded with controversy since its introduction last year, Commissioner Ben Lloyd said the water quality critical designation was probably even more controversial and damaging to the residents of Cheeks Township. Lloyd presented the motion that delayed action to set water critical area standards.

Tonight, the board will consider a schedule of meetings between the county and Chapel Hill and Carboro to begin the joint planning processes of those communities.
