Fencing teams win big

The UNC men's and women's fencing teams had a combined team record of 9-0 as they both rolled to victory in this weekend's tournament here.

The men's team defeated Navy twice and Duke and Wofford each once to run its overall record to 6-1. Jason Woo in sabre, Mark Elvin in foil and Scott Echols in epee all went a combined 8-1 in the matches to lead the team. The men were especially strong in sabre, going a combined 27-9 in the four contests. Karl Fimore was 8-2 in sabre to share honors for most wins in the event with Woo.

On the women's side, both the UNC A and B teams had a relatively easy time with the competition, going 5-0. The only scare of the day was against Navy, when the women lost the first three matches before rebounding to take nine of the last 11. Nhi Le and April Hardison each went 11-1 for the A team, which raised its record to 6-2 overall.

ymnasts break record

The North Carolina gymnastics team set a meet record by piling up 176.40 points and rolling to the team title Saturday at the Shenandoah Invitational gymnastics meet in Harrisonburg, Va.

The Tar Heels were paced by Missy Shaffner and Amy Bincarousky and finished ahead of teams from James Madison, Auburn and West Virginia.



When Wolf hit a hook shot at the 2:06 mark of the half, UNC led 40-26 and took a 42-31 halftime lead. All this time Tech was misfiring on outside shots or throwing errant passes. The Yellow Jackets had 17 turnovers, 13 in the first half.

Shaffner set a meet record by winning the all-around competition with a total of 36.40 points. Bincarousky won the vault with 9.50 points, another meet record.

The team competition ended Saturday, but individual competition continued Sunday. Results were not available at press time.

UVa. holds off UNC in women's hoops

Fourth-ranked Virginia blew the game open late in the first half and repeatedly repelled 15th-ranked North Carolina's rallies to down the Tar Heels 84-79 Saturday night before a crowd of 680 in Carmichael Auditorium. In the process, the undefeated Cavaliers snapped UNC's 22-game home win streak and impressed everyone in attendance with their textbook-style ball movement and all-around dominance.

Well, almost everyone.

"We sucked," UVA coach Debbie Ryan said without even a trace of a smile. "We just didn't have the killer instinct at all."

Ryan's raucous remark referred to the fact that Virginia, which led by as many as 16 early in the second half, couldn't put the pesky Tar Heels away. In fact, the Wahoos might have blown their advantage altogether had it not been for the clutch play of Donna Holt (20 points) and Daphne Hawkins (16). In one nine-minute stretch, the Cavs sensational sophomore backcourt duo accounted for all but two of the visitors 20 points.

"We were doing a lot of ball watching defensively," North Carolina coach Jennifer Alley said. "As a result, we were giving them a lot of uncontested shots, especially Hawkins and Holt."

Thanks to the "H-gals," UVA extended its 49-36 halftime bulge to 16 after just three minutes of second-stanza play. Despite its defensive deficiencies, UNC hung tough and trimmed the Cavaliers' lead to just five with 8:15 remaining. Freshman guard Liza Donnell's drive to the hoop spawned a threepoint play and made it 70-65 for Virginia.

After an exchange of turnovers cost UNC a chance to cut it to three, Kirsten Anderson answered with a five-footer for the visitors and some tough Wahoo

defense sent the Tar Heels' attack into the tank for nearly three minutes. Holt followed with an 18-footer and immediately thereafter converted her fourth steal of the contest into a layup. This decisive UVA spurt put them up by 11 and North Carolina never got closer than five again.

The game's first ten minutes were marked by aggressive defense and deadeye shooting by both sides which kept the game close. With Virginia up 21-19, however, consecutive three-point plays by Nancy Mayer and Liza Lank ignited the Cavaliers and sent them on a 14-4 run. UNC committed three turnovers in that time frame and 25 on the night.

Virginia improves to 18-0 overall and 6-0 in the ACC. North Carolina, which brought a five-game win streak into Saturday's battle, drops to 13-5, 4-2.

Several individual Tar Heel performers deserve special mention. First, Pam Leake racked up 29 points before fouling out with 3:47 to play. Alley was understandably proud; "Pam Leake has done a tremendous job of doing all she has to do while playing the point guard position (in place of the injured Darlene Cannon) as well." Leake leads the ACC in scoring, assists, and steals.

Freshman Marsha Matthews hit for 15 points and a game-high five assists while Marlene List added 14 points and four assists. Tia Poindexter and freshman Merlaine Oden were terrors on the boards, pulling down nine and eight respectively. Poindexter, who also scored nine points, played a whopping 38 minutes and got all her rebounds in the second half.

Alley thought that her team, which plays Georgia Tech tonight at 7:30 in Carmichael, might actually gain something from losing to Virginia. "When you play a team as talented as Virginia, you have to learn," she said. "Now when we go to Charlottesville, we'll know what we need to do to win there."



During this run, UNC coach Dean Smith was shuffling 10 players in and out of the lineup, while Tech's first seven were getting worn down. "They really wore us down," Hammonds said later. Warden added that the purple-bellied anaconda snake was not hibernating now and had been seen in the Student


Warden said he was concerned about parking lot safety since it posed a hazard to cars.

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
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said. "We can also have effective cooperation with organizations outside of the University, like area social-service agencies which have been dealing with rape and assault cases for years. Other schools go through the same things." Hassel said the campus community needed to be more educated about crime

and how to avoid it. "We need to encourage the awareness of individuals and by groups — aware-ness of good safety habits and defense

tactics," he said. Hassel said that in addition to encouraging better lighting and more emergency phones on-campus, more attention needed to be paid to victims of rape and assault.




