## Clemson, UNC tangle tonight

The Clemson Tigers like to run, force the ball down the throat of the opponent and occasionally kick it back for a three-point attempt. In short, they aren't a whole lot different from North Carolina.

"Clemson will push it at us, and we'll try to push it at them," Kenny Smith said. "It will be almost like playing ourselves in practice."

The Tigers and Tar Heels face off tonight at 9 p.m. (Raycom, Ch. 5). The game will mark the halfway point of the ACC slate for UNC, recently named No. 1 in the Associated Press poll for the first time since the second week of this season. The Tar Heels lead the conference with a 6-0 record, are 17-1 overall and sport a 15-game winning streak.

Clemson, on the other hand, suffered its first loss to Duke on Saturday, 105-103 in overtime. The Tigers whipped Winthrop Monday night to move to 18-1, and are ranked No. 14. They are also second in the ACC, with a 4-1 record. "If we sneak one out like Duke did, I'd be thrilled," said UNC coach Dean Smith. "I'm always satisfied if we can come out with a one-point win."

Coach Smith also discounted the theory that Clemson would be primed for the game because of the disappointing Blue Devil loss. "I don't play those games," he said. "I just try to get our team ready to play."

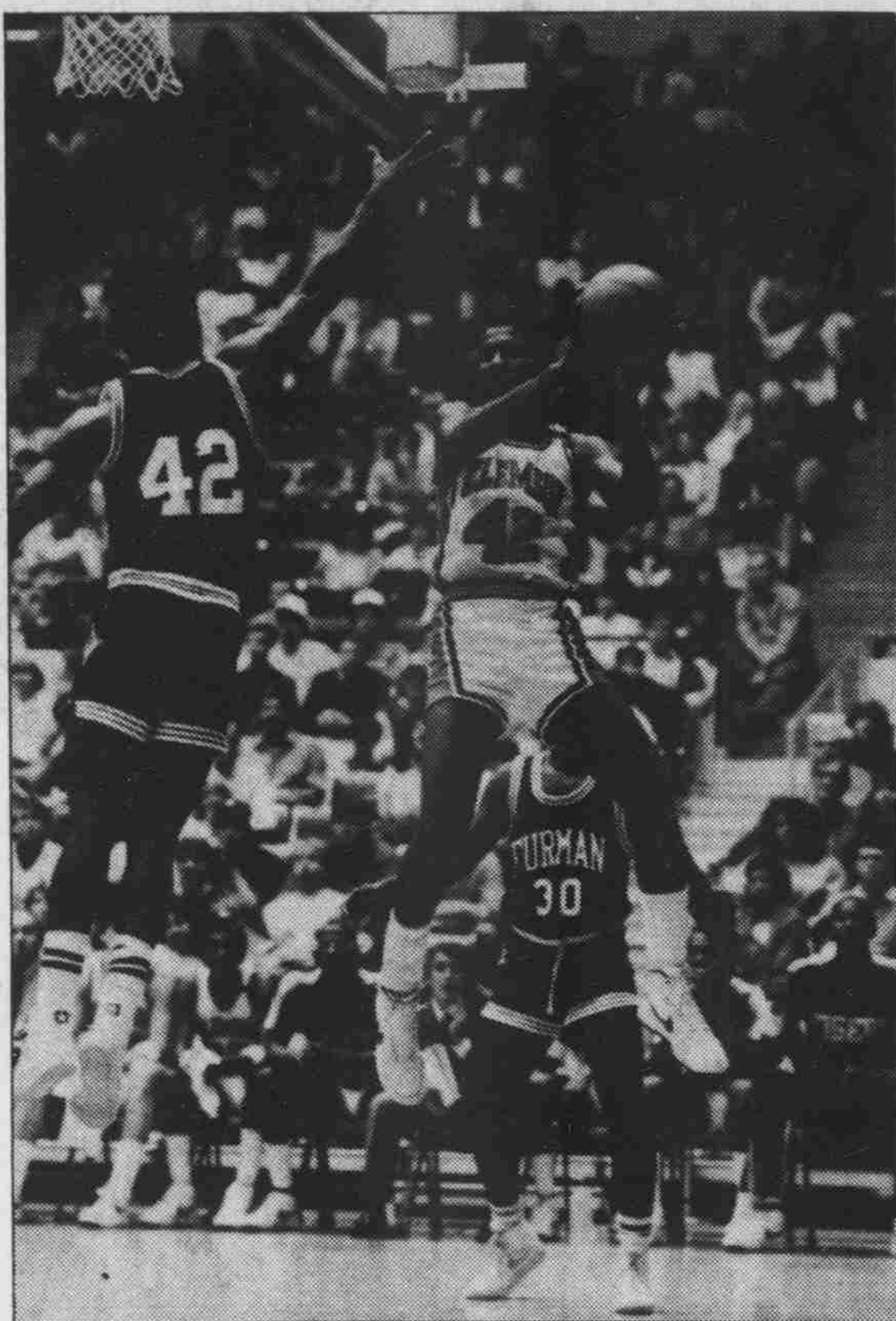
The Tigers are led by Horace Grant, a monstrous man in the paint who burned Duke for 33 points and 12 rebounds and is leading the league with a 19.0 scoring average. He also is among the nation's leaders in field-goal percentage, and is pulling down almost 10 rebounds per game to lead the league. "Clemson really has the horses down low," said Smith, who should be ready to play tonight after missing the Georgia Tech game with a sprained knee.

Clemson starts Grayson Marshall at the point, and much of the game will depend on whether he can deal with the front-court pressure. Marshall's running mate is Michael Tait, who scores at a 12.6 point clip and is a threat from three-point range.

Anthony Jenkins (10.3 ppg) mans one forward spot for Clemson, and is among league leaders in three-point shooting. Jerry Pryor has perhaps been the biggest surprise for Clemson, knocking in nearly 13 points a game and shooting 63 percent.

"They're a talented team," Smith said. "But we can't worry about just playing Clemson. We've got to worry about playing our game. Just like golf, you've got to play the field."

UNC freshman standout J.R. Reid said he had never played in Littlejohn Coliseum, but had heard it was a difficult place to play. "We will have to really concentrate," Reid said. "I've played against some of their players, and they're tough."

The Tigers' top reserves are Larry Middleton, Michael Brown and Elden Campbell, all of whom are averaging nearly 10 points a game. Coach Smith has said several times

that Campbell outplayed Reid when he saw the two play this summer, but the 6-10 freshman has not hit the conference with as big a force as some expected.

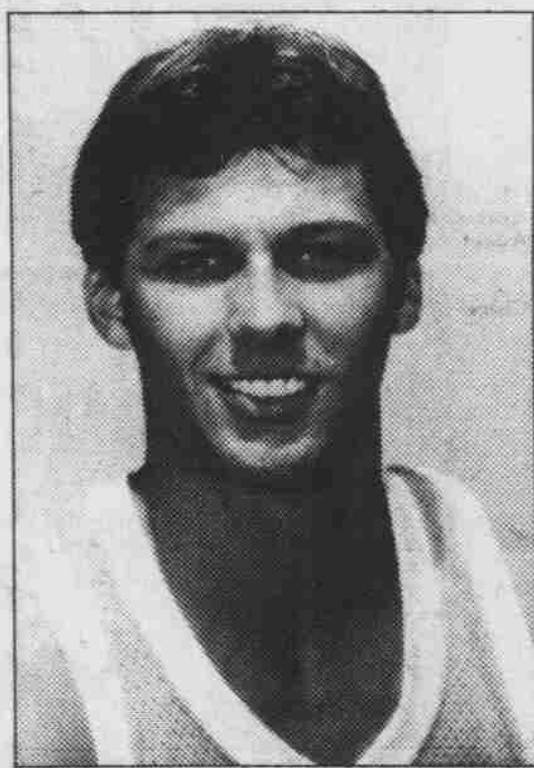
The nominees are:
