## Duke-UNC for charity

A women's basketball game will be the setting for a Ronald McDonald House Fundraiser when the Tar Heels take on the Duke Blue Devils at 7:30 p.m. on Feb. 17th in Durham. The Ronald McDonald House provides a temporary home for families of hospitalized children who are visiting hospitals on an outpatient basis. The proceeds from the game will benefit both the house in Durham, founded in 1979, and one now under construction in Chapel Hill.

Margie Herst, administrative assistant at the Durham House, said the event has been in the works for some time. "We have planned and planned," Herst said Monday. "There has been talk for a long time

and we wanted to do something." The UNC Marching Band annually participates in a fundraiser, and this year it is joining in with the Ronald McDonald House.

Along with the fundraiser, the Tar Heels will try to keep their hopes for an NCAA bid alive against a hungry Duke squad. The Blue Devils feature Chris Moreland, a tough inside scorer.

At halftime of the game there will be a shootout featuring Gov. Jim Martin. Duke men's coach Mike Krzyzewski and Miss North Carolina.

Tickets for the game can be purchased in advance or at the door from the Duke ticket office. The UNC Marching Band is also selling tickets in the Pit. Prices are \$5 for adults and \$3 for students.

## Hoops plays back-to-back

After dumping Wake Forest on Wednesday, UNC coach Dean Smith, the Master of Understatement, conjectured that the 94-85 win brought his team "one step closer to earning a berth in the NCAA tournament and to a possible regular-season ACC title."

At this point, with a 21-2 overall record and a 10-0 ACC mark, the Tar Heels should have at least the former goal wrapped up. And this weekend's competition should do nothing to shake UNC's goal of the latter.

On Saturday, the Tar Heels travel to Maryland's Cole Field House — the House That Lefty Left — to take on the Terrapins at 4 p.m. in a nationally televised contest (Raycom, ESPN). While UNC's Smith is a recent member of the 600 Club, Maryland's first-year mentor, Bob Wade, has yet to win a conference game. The team is winless in 10 ACC attempts and is 6-12 overall. The first time these teams

blocks in that game. J.R. Reid led North Carolina with 19 points.

But the action doesn't stop there, as UNC will catch a late flight back to Chapel Hill only to find the Marquette Warriors on its doorstep on Sunday at 4 p.m. (Raycom).

Marquette sports a look different from what the Tar Heels faced last year in Milwaukee's Mecca, a game in which UNC needed a late-game comeback keyed by Kenny Smith's two free throws to score a 66-64 win. Three starters and a head coach are gone from that team.

Returning from the '85-'86 squad is leading scorer and rebounder David Boone, a senior forward. The new chief of the Warriors is Chevy Chase look-alike Bob Dukiet (rhymes with Marquette). He coached for the last seven years at St. Peter's in New Jersey where his teams were consistently among the nation's top 10 in defensive field goal percentage — leading the NCAA last year with a 41.1 mark.

## Football signs 23 recruits

North Carolina signed 23 football recruits Wednesday, the first day that high school seniors could officially sign letters of intent.

Leading the list of UNC recruits was Deems May, the Parade All-America quarterback from Lexington who was rated the No. 2 quarterback prospect in the nation by one recruiting scout.

The Tar Heels got all-state pick Bill Bjerke of West Islip High in Long Island, N.Y., a 4.5 flyer who is expected to play strong safety. Bjerke turned down offers from Notre Dame and Iowa. UNC also got 6-4, 250-lb. lineman Dave Boone of North Canton, Ohio.

Two other top Tar Heel recruits were at the traditionally strong position of linebacker. Dwight Hollier of Hampton, Va. and 6-6 Roy Barker of Long Island also signed with UNC.

## Road action story of weekend

Cupid will have to go a long way to hit his mark for many UNC athletes this weekend as men's basketball, gymnastics, track, fencing and — yes — baseball teams all go on the road Saturday, highlighting this weekend's sports slate.

The baseball team, sporting a top recruiting class and a new pitching coach, Mark Halvorsen, officially opens its season Saturday at The Citadel in Charleston, S.C., at 1 p.m. The two teams meet again Sunday, same Bat-time, same Bat-channel.

Five blue-chip pitchers highlight the freshman class. They are right-handers Jim Dougherty, Ryan Jackson, Scott Lodgek, John Thoden and southpaw Michael Hoog. Of the five, three (Jackson, Thoden and

Hoog) were picks in the 1986 June amateur draft.

The Tar Heels also return pitchers Ken Turner, David Trautwein, Todd Kopczynski, shortstop Darin Campbell and right fielder Devy Bell.

"We're excited about the opening series with The Citadel," said UNC coach Mike Roberts. "We look forward to seeing how much our returning players have improved and how our talented freshmen react to pressure situations."

The track team is also busy this weekend. On Saturday, Brad Sullivan will be competing in the 55-meter dash at the Vitalis Olympic Invitational in East Rutherford, N.J. Also on Saturday, selected UNC tracksters will be in Fairfax, Va., at the Bud Light Invitational. And on Sunday, Kevin McGorty, UNC's top decathlete, will see action in Gainesville, Fla., at the TAC Indoor Multi-Events Championships.

In track action a little closer to home, the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference will conduct its track and field championships today and

Saturday in the Tin Can. The first event is the pole vault, set for 6 p.m. Competition Saturday begins at 11 a.m. Admission is free.

The gymnastics team travels to Raleigh for some Wolfpack action in a 2:30 p.m. match on Saturday.

The only Friday action on the agenda features the men's fencing team, which travels to colonial Williamsburg, Va., for a dual match with William & Mary and Haverford. Some of the men and women fencers have earned a pre-Spring Break trip to Florida to compete in the USFA National Junior Olympics in Tampa. The meet starts at 8 a.m. Saturday and runs through Monday.

The basketball team plays this weekend, too. The 3rd-ranked Tar Heel hoopers go to College Park, Md., to face the vastly-improved Maryland Terrapins Saturday at 4 p.m. They then return to the Smith Center Sunday to defend an 8-0 home record against the Marquette Warriors, also at 4 p.m.

Sylvia Rhyme Hatchell and Co. are the only other Tar Heel team to play at home this weekend. The women roundballers take to the court against Western Carolina at 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

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
