

# The UNC Jazz Festival — a weekend of cool concerts

The UNC Jazz Festival is 11 years old, and by the look of this year's program, it is going from strength to strength. Once again, the jazz weekend will feature a variety of concerts with performers ranging from high school bands to guest artists, thus ensuring that the Festival will be as educative as it is entertaining.

Festival events this weekend will include concerts Friday and Saturday

nights as well as clinics during the days.

One featured guest artist is Jim Snidero, an alto saxophonist whose first album, *Jim Snidero — On Time*, has received critical acclaim. Guest artists The Jazz Ambassadors — the U.S. Army Field Band — will be getting a welcome chance to play strictly modern concert jazz and not the patriotic tunes with which they have come to be associated, according

Festival organizer Jim Ketch, a member of the music faculty. Both guest artists will give clinics.

"It's a great chance for high school and college groups to get critiqued," said Ketch, who describes the organization of the event as something of an administrative handful, albeit a labor of love. Performing high school bands will include those from schools in Kinston, Raleigh, Durham and Greensboro, and scheduled college bands include UNC-Charlotte and

UNC-Wilmington, East Carolina University and Elon College. Our own UNC-CH Jazz Band will be highlighted during the two-day program and will accompany soloist Snidero on Friday night, in addition to performing their own mini-concert on Saturday afternoon.

"We have about \$1,000 worth of educative materials that the students can purchase," said Ketch. Such items include transcripts and *Music Minus*

*One*, a recording from which a key part is missing so the student can take its place. "The jam session really doesn't exist anymore," Ketch said. Festival T-shirts will also be available.

Ketch is particularly pleased with this year's program. He describes guest Snidero as "an excellent improviser, which is exciting in a young performer." Ketch's own quintet will be playing with Snidero. "It will be great to hear him and get a chance to play with him," Ketch said.

It is the first time that the Festival has featured a big band as guest artist, so Ketch was especially keen for small, combo jazz to be represented. The one Snidero/quintet rehearsal will be Thursday night, but Ketch said he doesn't see this as a cause for concern. He said the great thing about jazz is that "people speak the same language."

The concerts are sponsored by the Carolina Union Performing Arts Committee, and Ketch said he was very pleased to be able to offer free tickets this year since the fees for The Jazz Ambassadors are largely "paid for by Uncle Sam."

Ketch said that the Festival usually draws good audiences. "It's a kind of Pied Piper thing," he said. "Come and hear it once and you might want to return and hear it again. And since it's free, why not come back a second time?"

Jim Ketch Quintet, UNC Jazz Band and Jim Snidero will perform Friday at 8 p.m. The U.S. Army Field Band and Jazz Ambassadors will perform Saturday at 8 p.m. Both concerts will be in Memorial Hall. There will be no admission charge, but free tickets should be picked up at the Union Box Office.

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"This gives a very important message to the Reagan administration," he said. "Eighty percent of the Latin American population believes this is the order of countries that have tried to achieve peace and democracy."

The United States has had a "non-policy" toward Latin America since as early as 1899, Cerezo said.

"It's been a muddled-through policy," he said, "and it's done a great disservice to the Central American people."

## Faculty

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Chancellor Christopher Fordham said the report was leading the School of Education in the right direction.

"The school needed to focus more on preparing teachers for the schools. We need to relate to and be as helpful as we can to the public schools," Fordham said. "I am pleased with the
