Helped by four Gamecock errors, two Tar Heel home runs and a complete game from starter Jim Dougherty, UNC completed a two-game sweep of 21st-ranked South Carolina by an 11-5 score Thursday afternoon. The victory evened out UNC's season mark at 8-8.

The game began shakily for Dougherty and the Heels, as South Carolina scored two firstinning runs. The Gamecocks loaded the bases on a Hardin Brown one-out single, followed by a one-base error and a walk. Dougherty then hit Adrian Adkins to force in a run, and Gamecock catcher Tray Witt followed with a ground out to score Skeets Thomas.

South Carolina sophomore starter Mike (Cyclops) Siopes, a Raleigh native, opened impressively, retiring eight of the first nine batters. A two-out walk by Tom Nevin in the third inning ended Siopes' run, however, and keyed a six-run North Carolina inning.

Nevin in getting on base by virtue of third baseman Mike Songini's error. Chris DeFranco singled to bring Nevin in, Ron Maurer singled to load the bases and Chris Lauria put the Tar Heels ahead 3-2 with a two-run single. Jesse Levis finished the scoring with a three-run homer, which would prove to be all the scoring the Heels would need.

South Carolina pulled close in the top of the fourth, scoring three runs with a two-run Mark Taylor homer and Darrin Campbell's error that allowed Songini to

Siopes' wildness (three walks in the first three innings) brought in Gamecock reliever Tony Spires for his first appearance of the year, who came on in the fourth with no outs and one on. But Spires was not effective, as the junior transfer walked a batter and vielded a single and sacrifice fly to score two North Carolina runs and make the score 8-5.

Spires' ineffectiveness showed in the fifth, as he continued to fall behind most Tar Heel batsmen. Spires walked Levis and gave up a homer to Dave Arendas to make

pitcher, Will Lewis, was not immune to the scatter-shot style afflicting his teammates, as his seventh-inning wild pitch allowed Ron Woodall to cross the plate and complete the scoring for the day.

Meanwhile, Dougherty notched his third win of the season against only one loss, giving up only two earned runs on eight hits. The sophomore from Brentwood, N.Y., became stronger as the game progressed, striking out five in the last seven innings and walking only one batter, that in the first.

The victory marked the second time this season that Dougherty and fellow sophomore Michael Hoog have notched back-to-back complete game victories. The two have six of UNC's eight wins.

Coach Mike Roberts was pleased with the Heels third straight win, and their fourth victory in the last five games. "Right now, I'm happy with any victory, and, especially considering the competition, I'm very happy with our wins over South Carolina.'

Baseball stuns USC again, 11-5 Koll and Catullo both win in NCAA Championships

AMES, Iowa - The UNC wrestling team's six-member contingent at the NCAA Championships has not fared nearly as well as it had hoped. Of the six, only two won their firstround matches, and the rest anxiously had to wait to find out if they would wrestle again this year.

Senior three-time All-American Rob Koll, the ACC's 158-pound champion, raised his record to 37-1 with a 14-6 decision over John Ripley of Army. Koll is the winningest wrestler in ACC history, with a career record of 151-20-1, and is looking to

become UNC's second four-time All-American.

Junior Enzo Catullo, at 134 pounds, also won his first round match, defeating Mitch Tatonetti of Kent State, 13-5. Catullo took second in the conference for the third straight year, but is looking to become an All-American for the first time.

The rest of the wrestlers: John Welch at 126, Lenny Bernstein at 142, Ben Oberly at 177 and Glen Pazinko at 190, all lost their first-round matches. They were thus at the mercy of the system to find out if they were still to wrestle or not. In NCAA

wrestling tournament rules, an earlyround loser still has a chance as long as the man who defeated him survives.

Welch and Bernstein's opponents both lost, eliminating them from the tournament. Oberly's opponent won, allowing him to face R.J. Mebe of Nebraska-Omaha, the No. 8 seed in the tournament, in order to stay alive.

Pazinko's opponent also won, so he was to face Carlton Kinkade of Central Michigan, in a late match last night. Oberly and Pazinko must now win three matches in order to place
