

# Classroom snake comes home

From Associated Press reports  
LEETSDALE, Pa. — A lost boa constrictor named for rock star David Bowie is once again a snake in the class.  
His return to biology class at Quaker Valley High School ended a three-week road tour that received mixed reviews in this Pittsburgh suburb.  
Somebody had "borrowed" David from Ed Schroth's lab, and somebody

brought him back, the teacher said Monday. No questions were asked, and no reprimands were delivered.  
"If you want to say that Batman returned it, I don't care," Schroth said.  
David's disappearance prompted nervousness among some nearby residents, who called Schroth to complain about the possibility they might be bitten or choked to death.  
"I had people calling, screaming at

me from 10, 20 miles away."  
But the 6 1/2-foot, 19-pound boa is a peewee by snake standards, Schroth said.  
David appeared to be in good spirits Monday. He was chilled by recent temperatures in the 40s, however.  
"I've had to keep the heating pad on him. He's such a wimpy thing," said Schroth, who explained that even mild cold makes reptiles docile.

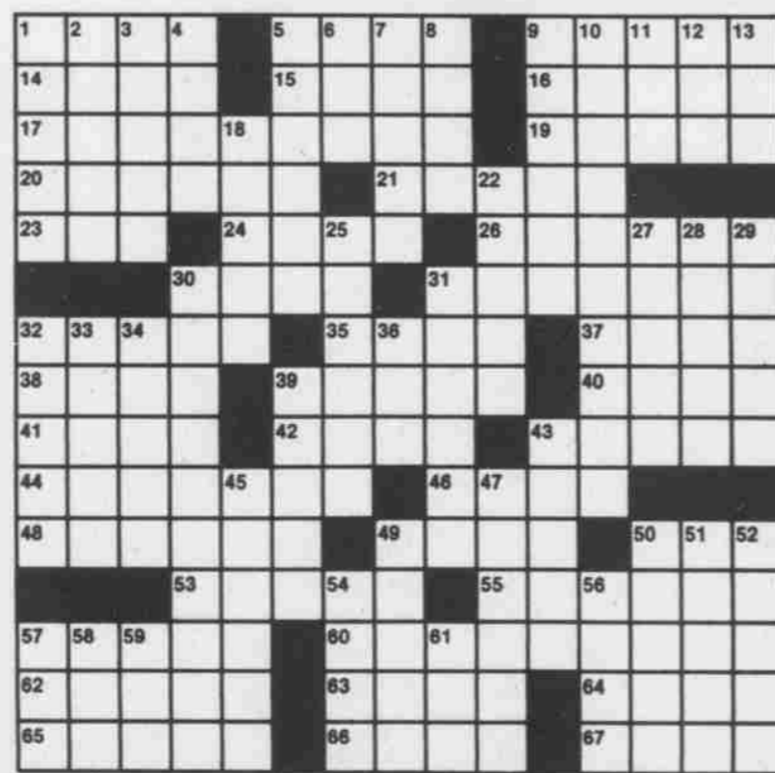
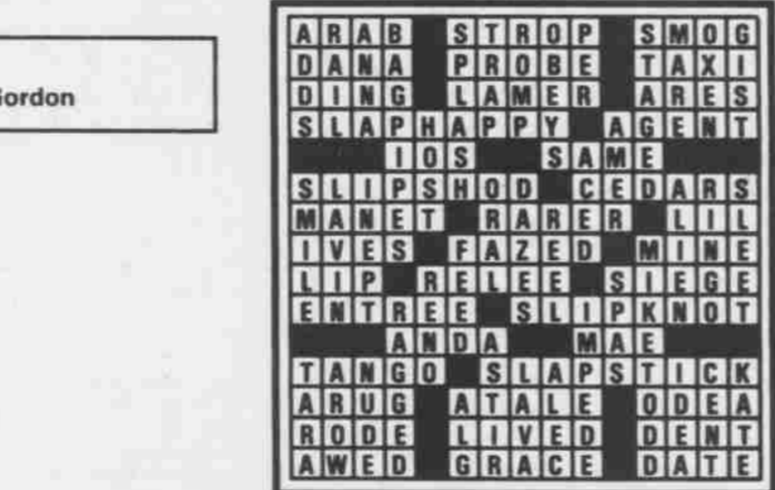
