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two weakened-arm tackles before high-stepping his way into the end zone with 2:34 remaining in the game.

Bradley's score, which came on the Middies' 80th play from scrimmage (to the Tar Heels' 52 at that point), was the only offensive touchdown on an evening when both offenses treated the football like a live grenade — to the tune of numerous overthrows, underthrows, dropped passes and an amazing 11 fumbles.

The winning touchdown came one play after a novelty of sorts — a completed forward pass — in the unlikely form of a 48-yard Alton Grizzard-to-B.J. Mason aerial from the Navy 32 yard line.

Mason, listed as a defensive back/quarterback on the Midshipmen roster, slipped behind the Tar Heels' zone defense, which was pulled toward the line of scrimmage by Grizzard's play fake in the backfield. The ensuing diving catch, Mason's first reception of the year, was one of only three Grizzard completions (for a whopping 98 yards) on the evening. But it was more than enough to complement the Midshipmen's sometimes-sloppy wish-bone attack.

Navy weathered the UNC storm all afternoon with a pound-'em-'til-they-crack rushing attack that kept a battle-weary Tar Heel defense on the field for nearly 40 minutes on the soggy Kenan Stadium turf.

But the Tar Heel defense rose to the occasion time after time.

UNC tailback-turned-cornerback Torin Dorn set the tone in the opening minutes of the game when he intercepted Grizzard's first offering and returned it 54 yards for a touchdown. Dorn made a leaping grab of a Grizzard pass downfield, broke a tackle at midfield and raced down the right sideline untouched to give the Tar Heels a 7-0 lead after just 96 seconds of play.

Dorn, who has returned kickoffs for the Tar Heels in 1989, said it was good to get the ball and see some open field again. "Whenever I can get my hands on the ball — and reminisce on the old tailback days — it feels great," Dorn said. "Today, I just felt like I was running in the wind."

Meanwhile, the Navy offense looked as if it was running against the wind.

Only two Frank Schenk field goals soiled UNC's defensive performance through three quarters. The first, a 25-yarder with 2:15 remaining in the opening frame to bring Navy to within 7-3, was set up by Middle defensive back Lonny Stare's block of a Scott McAlis-

ter punt in UNC territory.

In the third quarter, another UNC miscue on offense set up the Midshipmen near midfield. Burnette's mishandling of the snap from center was recovered by Navy linebacker David Lowe at the UNC 42 yard line. Six plays and 16 yards later, Schenk connected from 44 yards out to make it a one point game, at 7-6, entering the fourth quarter.

Navy drove to the UNC seven yard

line on its opening possession of the final frame. But UNC strong safety Reggie Clark hammered Middle half-back Rodney Purifoy and the ball popped loose. Tar Heel linebacker Willie Joe Walker recovered.

But after a three-plays-and-out performance by the UNC offense — one of 10 such quickies on the evening — the Middies came calling again.

This time it was UNC defensive tackle Dennis Tripp — who had a team-

high 11 tackles — who made the play, separating Grizzard from the ball on a third-down option play. The ever-present Clark recovered at the UNC 14.

"Our defense kept us in the ballgame throughout the game, forced turnover after turnover," Brown said. "The way we played defensively we deserved to win the football game."

Of course, unfortunately for UNC, offense and special teams are still integral parts of college football.

## Heels challenge nation's best but come up short

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. — The UNC men's soccer team missed out on an upset opportunity Sunday when the Tar Heels fell to top-ranked Virginia, 3-0, in an Atlantic Coast Conference matchup.

North Carolina, ranked 11th in the nation by Soccer America, fell to 6-3-1 overall and 1-1-1 in the ACC. The Cavaliers improved to 11-0 and 3-0.

Virginia left out in front early when a controversial call gave the Cavaliers' Curt Onalfo a penalty kick at the 9:07 mark. Onalfo put the freebie past UNC goalie Watson Jennison, giving Virginia the only goal it needed. Ben Crawley and Jeff Bynum also scored for the Cavaliers late in the second half.

The Tar Heels took just four shots on goal throughout the game, while Virginia sent 18 attempts at Jennison. Derek Missimo, UNC's all-time leading scorer, was unable to even get a shot off against a tough Cavalier defense.

### Field hockey downs Cal State Chico

BERKELEY, Ca. — Imke Lempers scored two goals and assisted on a third to lead the North Carolina women's field hockey team to a 4-0 win over Cal State Chico Saturday.

UNC, which improved to 6-1, will face Stanford today.

### Volleyball takes third in Chicago

CHICAGO, Ill. — The UNC women's volleyball team placed third in the Northwestern Invitational with a loss to eventual champion Rice Friday and a victory over New Mexico State on Saturday.

Against the Owls, Liz Berg shined for the Tar Heels with 25 kills, six service aces and 18 digs, but UNC (9-5) fell in straight games, 16-14, 15-11, 15-11.

North Carolina bounced back against New Mexico State, 15-8, 14-16, 15-11, 15-7, in the consolation game.

### Golfers eighth after first round

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — North Carolina women golfers are eighth in a field

of 15 teams after Sunday's first round of play in the True Temper Memphis Women's Intercollegiate tournament, which continues today and tomorrow.

Furman University leads the pack with a cumulative score of 300. Duke and Kentucky are tied for second with 307, and the Tar Heels have a one-day total of 318.

Sophomore Tara Hipp and Junior Amber Marsh each shot a 79 Sunday to lead UNC. Hipp and Marsh are tied for 22nd in individual competition. Sophomore Debbie Doniger and freshman Jessica Wood are tied for 30th with scores of 80 apiece.

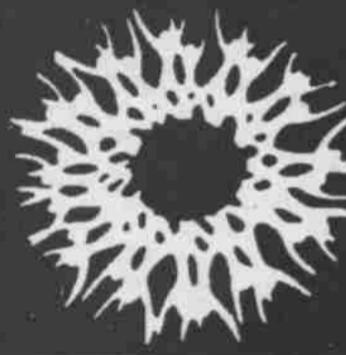
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bounded her own shot, making the score 4-0 and sealing the Tar Heel victory.

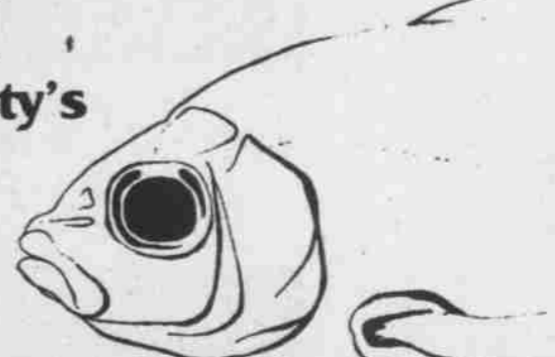
