R-e-s-p-e-c-t. Aretha Franklin sang for it during the late 1960s.

Some twenty-odd years later, UNC ex-soccer player Shannon Higgins, one of the greatest soccer players in UNC history, says the word which became such a big hit song for Franklin has not completely found its way into the world of women's sports.

The implication from Higgins is that

one time to watch the women's soccer teams at their schools, and then they automatically assume that all of the teams are about as good as the ones at their schools," said Higgins, who has just been promoted to the head coaching job of the women's

University Men especially take women's athletics for granted, Higgins said.

"The men do not think women's soccer is competitive because they do not think the women players are fast and

the lack of respect toward strong enough," Higgins said.

"Toward the end of my junior and senior year, we got quite a bit of support from the fans at North Carolina, but we had to win first. I'd say we averaged about 800 people at the games."

Convincing males that women athletes are legitimate competitors will not be difficult, according to Higgins.

"I think if you could just get them out to one game, they would see that women's sports are competitive," Higgins said.

Higgins accomplishments have been a key factor in establishing a dynasty at UNC - one comparable to the UCLA men's basketball dynasty. Since 1982, the UNC women's soccer team has won eight national titles.

Higgins' career includes: being named 1988 national player of the year by Soccer America, graduating as first team All-American, being named to the first team 1988 All-South Region, being named most valuable offensive player in the 1988 NCAA Final Four and scoring three goals in a 4-1 win over N.C. State in the 1988 championship

Higgins, who had her jersey number retired, said she could not tell if male athletes were intimidated by her and other female athletes' strong performances. But if she ever ran into that problem, she said, handling it would be relatively easy.

"I would just try to appeal to him as a person," Higgins said. "I would let

him know that I know as much about soccer as he does and try to establish some common ground with him."

At George Washington, Higgins finds herself in her first coaching position and she feels optimistic that the program is on its way to being competitive.

"I feel that we are on the verge to

cracking the top twenty," Higgins said. In the meantime, Higgins said other females considering coaching as a profession should not get discouraged if they have not found jobs.

"I've seen a trend in many of the sports where most people are hiring women to coach women's teams, whereas before they would only hire men." The teams would only consider men for the coaching positions because that was the traditional thing to do, according to Higgins.

As women become more knowledgeable about sports and the rules, society can expect to see more women

in the head coaching ranks. A native of Washington, Higgins came to UNC because she was impressed with the academic and athletic

programs that the school had to offer. "I was so impressed with the people because they were just so friendly," Higgins said. "I just fell in love with this school."
