## Chancellor approves summer appointments to Honor Court

Chancellor Paul Hardin's approval of summer appointments to the Undergraduate Honor Court will allow the court to begin hearing summer cases, said Jeffrey Cannon, assistant dean of students.

The court was prevented from sitting after Mark Bibbs, chief justice of the

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Nancy Zucker, student attorney general, said last week that a case scheduled for last Thursday was postponed because of the congress closure.

But Jason Kaus, vice chairman of the Honor Court, said Monday that no cases were postponed last week. The Thursday case was not postponed because it had not been officially scheduled, he

"Everything is on go," Kaus said. Zucker said the court was hearing cases this week but refused to comment on Hardin's approvals.

Susan Ehringhaus, assistant to the chancellor and senior University counsel, said Hardin had the power to approve court members under the authority of the Code of the UNC Board of Governors. Congress receives its traditional confirmation role by delegation from the chancellor, she said.

Kaus said the court also faced problems getting started last summer. "The chancellor stepped in then and exercised his authority," he said.

Bibbs issued a restraining order May 28 shutting down congress indefinitely after Reps. Andrew Cohen and Mike Kolb brought a case against Speaker Tim Moore. The order challenges the legality of Moore's appointment of 11 students to the summer congress without prior approval from fall congress.

The order disrupted several student programs by preventing congress from disbursing student fee money to them, including the UNC Pauper Players.

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
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
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
