




Field hockey lacks experience, but looks to reload, not rebuild

For North Carolina field hockey coach Karen Shelton, success has been commonplace throughout the past decade. Eight consecutive ACC titles, a national championship and five trips to the Final Four have put UNC on the map as a field hockey power.

But despite a decade of success, the coming season may test the mettle of Shelton and her Tar Heels.

UNC lost four seniors to graduation from last year's 20-4 NCAA runner-up squad. Laurel Hershey, Peggy Anthon, Beth Taterosian and Terri Buck, the cornerstones of UNC field hockey over the past four years, are gone. With them went a four-year record of 77-10.

"There's no question it's a rebuild-ing year," Shelton said. "We have to replace four talented seniors.
"This is a hard-working group, but

they are also very young," the UNC coach said of a Tar Heel team which boasts only two seniors and two juniors.

Seniors Jennifer Clark and Nancy Lang will team with juniors Mary Hartzell and Amy Cox to form the vet-

eran core of this year's team, "Those individuals will be the heart and soul of this team," Shelton said.

'We'll look to Jennifer Clark to score a lot of goals for us this year," Shelton said of her All-America back. Clark, from Lebanon, Pa., did just that last year, punching in 21 goals from her sweeper position to lead the Tar Heels

and rank her second in the ACC. In addition to her scoring duties, Clark and goalie Peggy Storrar will anchor a young Tar Heel defense. Storrar, a redshirt sophomore from Mahopac, N.Y., started all 24 games for UNC last year, allowing only 1.31 goals per game

Sophomore Cinda Carpenter, a Montechanin, Del., native, will shift to the center back spot from the left back position she held for 23 games last year. The other two backfield spots are up for grabs, and may be filled by redshirt freshmen Jessica Grasso and Sara John-

The other Tar Heel senior is Nancy Lang. The All-ACC midfielder's six goals and 27 assists ranked her second in scoring on last year's team, and she will be counted on to guide North Carolina's offense this year, Cox, a starter at last year, will slide back to join Lang and Hartzell in the midfield.

Many of Lang's assists this year may be turned into goals by the stick of sophomore forward Stephanie Walsh. The left wing was named 1990's ACC Rookie of the Year after scoring 13 goals, including the game-winner in UNC's 1-0 national semifinal win over

Walsh will be joined at forward by a pair of sophomores: returning starter Kelly Staley and first-year starter Jen-

nifer Blizzard. Shelton also pointed to freshmen Barbara Hansen, Sharon Moore, Amy Moyers and Kimberly Schroll as new-

comers who could eventually see play-The Tar Heels will open with an unusually strong schedule, playing their first four games on the road and their first six games against top-20 teams,

including ACC-rival Duke. Regarding the possibility of another conference championship and NCAA run, Shelton hedged her bets. "It's definitely a possibility," she said of the ACC title, "but the entire ACC will gear

its season towards us.' One would expect the Tar Heels to be up to the challenge


