Wrestlers see red as Pack pulls away

A day after the N.C. State and North Carolina women's basketball teams hooked up in a hard fought contest at Carmichael Auditorium, the schools battled one another again Thursday night in the same arena.

This time, the sport was wrestling. And once again, the bout went down to the wire.

The 22nd-ranked Wolfpack clawed its way to a thrilling come-from-behind 22-13 victory against the 11th-ranked Tar Heels. NCSU raised its record to 9-3-1, 1-0 in the ACC, while UNC fell to 5-4, 0-1 in the conference.

"When you lose at home in front of your home crowd and your guys don't

wrestle like they should, especially against State, it starts to get to you, especially when you try to be a leader," said UNC junior Shane Camera, fighting back tears.

UNC led 13-10 with three matches left. The Tar Heels seemed poised to close out the contest.

But the Wolfpack pounced back and blew the match wide open. At 177 pounds, NCSU's Steve Williams nipped UNC's Stan Banks 3-1 to even the match at 13-13.

At 190 pounds, UNC's Todd Hartung

appeared to be in control of his match. With 50 seconds remaining in the bout, Hartung took down State's Dan Madson, giving UNC a two-point advantage.

But the tide turned when Madson escaped from Hartung's grasp with 30 seconds left. Closing the gap to a point, Madson then gained a reversal and the victory with only five seconds left.

In the heavyweight match, NCSU's Sylvester Terkay pinned UNC's Scott Greenberg less than two minutes into the opening period, ending the Tar Heels' victory hopes.

"It worked out well for us," said N.C. State coach Bob Guzzo. "I thought our kids really wrestled hard. Any time you compete against Carolina, it is a competitive rivalry. It was a very satisfying win because Carolina has a great team."

UNC coach Bill Lam was not impressed with his team's performance. "I really don't think we fought as hard as we should have," Lam said. "I was really disappointed with the amount of physicalness and mixing it up. We did not wrestle like a top-20 team tonight."

The night began well for UNC, as Ty Moore, ranked fifth in the nation at 118 pounds, came away with an 8-0 victory versus State's Randy Minadeo.

The Tar Heels increased their lead to 7-0 when Jody Staylor defeated State's Michael Norton at 126 pounds.

But NCSU fought back, winning the next two bouts and tying the score at seven. UNC then won two of the next three matches to gain the 13-10 lead.

Tar Heels, Cavs attempt to fend off ACC free falls

In the basketball amusement park that is commonly called the ACC, two traditional powerhouses, North Carolina and Virginia, seem to have had a strange fascination with roller coasters this season.

Coming into Saturday's 4 p.m. matchup in the Smith Center, both teams appear to be screaming down the ride's biggest hill. Wednesday night, North Carolina, 13-3 and 3-2 in the ACC, lost 99-88 to heavy underdog N.C. State, while Virginia, 8-7 and 2-3, dropped a 51-48 heartbreaker to conference patsy Clemson.

Saturday's game may go a long way toward deciding which team begins the long climb back to the top of the hill, and which team details at the bottom.

Wednesday, the 10th-ranked Tar Heels fell victim to State's giant-killer Tom Gugliotta, who poured in 36 points, snared eight rebounds, dished out five assists, blocked two shots and grabbed four steals.

The game was not all bad news for the Tar Heels, though. Sophomore forward Brian Reese continued to put the pieces together, strating the Wolfpack for a career-high 22 points in 25 minutes. This followed a nine-point, four-dunk performance against Villanova Sunday. Reese also poured in 16 points versus Maryland Jan. 13.

UNC's senior guard Hubert Davis had a rough day against N.C. State, shooting 4 of 13 from the field. But Davis has been the Tar Heels' most consistent offensive player all season, averaging 19.7 points per game on 51-percent shooting. Davis also remains North Carolina's sole 3-point threat, shooting at a 43.1-percent clip from funland.

Until Wednesday, the Tar Heels had

been stellar on the defensive end of the court, allowing their opponents only 39.9-percent shooting. State, however, seemed to solve the North Carolina man-to-man, bombing away with uncanny accuracy. The Pack shot 55.6 percent from the field, and a smoking 45.2 percent from behind the 3-point line.

Based on Virginia's game against Clemson, though, the Cavaliers pose little offensive threat to the Tar Heels. Against a weak defensive team, Virginia had only three players in double figures. Senior forward Bryant Stith (19.6 ppg) scored 11, senior guard Anthony Oliver added 13, and freshman point guard Cory Alexander led the Cavs with 16.

Freshman 6-foot-8 forward Junior Burrough, averaging 12.5 ppg, managed only one point against the Tigers.

As a team, Virginia shot blanks, going 20 of 59 from the field.

UNC's sophomore point man Derrick Phelps must be his usual menacing self on the defensive end to counter Alexander, who is playing beyond his years. In five ACC contests, Alexander has turned the ball over only 12 times. Phelps, leading the Tar Heels with 42 steals, will be counted on to keep Alexander from controlling the play.

A more important task for North Carolina will be to shut down two-time All-ACC performer Stith. If Stith is allowed as many open shots as Gugliotta was, North Carolina might just experience some serious motion sickness.
