

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But even before such elaborate solutions are implemented, officials across the state plan to increase their emphasis on expanding parental involvement. After the tests were given, the state set up criteria that each school should

meet. Triplett said schools that failed the report card would be alerted in February.

Hoke added that a warning would be sent to schools that fell short in two or three areas.

After being warned, the school will be required to create a state-approved plan for improvement and will have two years to implement the plan, she said.

If the school fails to improve, the state board can decide to replace the local superintendent and can appoint its own board of education, Hoke said,

Sunday, at the Mobil 1 Grand Prix Meet in Fairfax, Va., the Tar Heel women's 3,200-meter relay team won in an NCAA provisional time of 8:51.87. The men's 1,600 relay squad placed first in 3:13.54.

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
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
