Capowski said. To deter unwanted loiterers, only minimal lighting was planned for the park, Capowski added.

Capowski said the council would listen carefully to residents' concerns at the meeting.

The town has spent \$144,000 acquiring the land and planning its development and proposes to spend an additional \$158,000 developing it. Funds will come evenly from capital reserve and the interest earned from payments-in-lieu of land.

To build the park, the road that leads

to the park would have to be paved, according to a memorandum to the council from Chapel Hill Town Manager Cal Horton.

In response to the concerns of citizens living near the park, the council held a public hearing last summer and made changes in the park's design.

Under the new design, the basketball court will be cut from a full-court to half-court, a minimum 80-foot landscape buffer will be maintained between the park and residents, the parking lot will be reduced from a 14-car capacity to a six-car capacity, and

Collums Road will be paved.

Horton said these changes, especially decreasing the size of the basketball court and parking lot, would make the park less likely to draw visitors from outside the neighborhood.

Werner said the design changes were made to concede to residents' wishes and to make the park more of a neighborhood park rather than a city park.

The town owns 10 acres in the North Forest Hills subdivision. Four acres were deeded to the town by the subdivision's developer, and two years ago the town bought six more.

In "Sometimes Love Just Ain't Enough," lead vocalist Crystal Harwell, a junior, put Patti Smythe to shame. Also, much applause for senior Laura Lee in her successful endeavor to compete with Sinead O'Connor in "Nothing Compares 2 U."

The Tar Heel Voices not only entertained the audience with their musical abilities, but also showed their comical

side with skits in between sets.

Under the theme "Loony Tunes," the group offered take-offs of boob tube favorites such as "Chapel Hill 90210" and "Silence of the Yams."

The two-hour concert concluded with a magnificent grand finale, The Human League's "Fascination," which sent chills down the spine as the audience erupted in applause.

The Tar Heel Voices were then beckoned back on stage to perform an encore, which they did with REM's "Shiny Happy People" and a humorous impersonation of Michael Stipe by a very capable lead vocalist.

tary mission." Connell said he thought that changing the present policy, by allowing homosexuals to serve, would have a detrimental effect on the military.

"We really do believe that it's going to hurt the military as a whole," he said.

Military personnel, including ROTC cadets, will have a difficult time adjusting to the enlistment of openly homosexual troops, Connell said.

"It's going to be tough," Connell said. "I truly believe that most men are against homosexuals serving."

Connell said he thought the biggest obstacle to homosexual service was the attitude of the American society as a whole. "The military is just a microcosm of American society," he said.

Just because the new president might change a policy, it does not mean that people can change their opinions about the issue, Connell said. "We're not going to be able to remove attitudes ... by presidential decree," he said.

Military leaders will have to address how to incorporate homosexuals in the military, Connell said. "We're going to have to investigate the whole problem of privacy and privation," he said.

The current policy excluding homosexuals can be changed by the president, Congress, the Pentagon or through

the courts.

Doug Ferguson, co-chairman of Bisexuals, Gay Men, Lesbians and Allies for Diversity, said he disagreed with the present military policy barring gays and lesbians. "One of the big goals of B-GLAD this year was to challenge the military, and, thus, the U.S. policy."

Ferguson said since Clinton had said he would change the policy to allow homosexuals into the military, B-GLAD members would give the new administration until next fall before attempting to make a change in the policy.

"We'll take a wait and see attitude to see if Clinton follows through," Ferguson said.

Ferguson said that if Clinton chose not to change the policy, B-GLAD members would put into action a five-year plan to work for a new policy at UNC.

The group's first step would be to approach UNC ROTC officials to solicit a letter supporting their cause for change. B-GLAD members would then present their case before the UNC Faculty Council, Ferguson said.

If the policy were not changed by the end of the five-year period, B-GLAD members would then request that the University no longer give academic credit for military classes, Ferguson said. "The present U.S. policy cripples the

military because there are quite a few competent soldiers who are gay," Ferguson said. "The military wastes a lot of time and money on witch hunts."

"There are just too many good soldiers that are gay and lesbian."

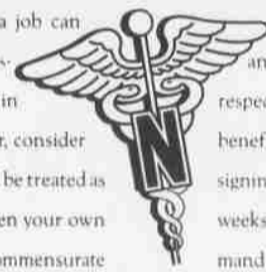
