Tar Heels prepare royal welcome for Monarchs

So this year, it's Old Dominion. In past years, North Carolina's opening-game opponents have included basketball powerhouses The Citadel, San Diego St., Tennessee-Chattanooga and Fordham.

Today, the Tar Heels open their 1992-93 campaign at 7:30 p.m. against the Monarchs of Old Dominion, a member of the Colonial Athletic Conference. But not just any old member.

The Monarchs finished 1991-92 with a 15-15 record and are the defending CAA champions by virtue of winning the conference tournament. ODU's season ended with a first-round loss in the NCAA Tournament to Kentucky, 88-69, in Worcester, Mass.

The Monarchs return two starters from that team, but what has fans in Norfolk buzzing is a heralded recruiting class which will have its coming out party tonight. Two freshmen should start, as well as a junior transfer.

The two freshmen will be up front, with 6-9 Odell Hodge and 6-6 Marion Mullen making their first college starts. The 240-pound Hodge will man the post after a storied high school career in which he finished as Virginia's all-time leading prep scorer.

Guard Keith Jackson and forward Petey Sessoms lead the returnees. Jackson, a 6-foot-5 senior from Washing-

ton, is the leading returning scorer for Old Dominion. He averaged 11.8 points per game last season, and led the team with 53 3-pointers after catching 68 treys as a sophomore.

Sessoms, a wiry 6-7, 190-pound sophomore small forward, averaged 9.0 points and 5.3 rebounds per game in '91-'92, but finished the season strong. He scored 21 points and snared 11 boards

against Kentucky and was named the CBS Player of the Game. Sessoms displayed enough talent to be selected to the conference all-freshman team.

The other starter should be junior guard Kevin Swan. The 6-2 junior from Hampton, Va., transferred from Central Connecticut St., where he scored 19.7 ppg and dished 4.6 assists per game in 1990-91.

Head coach Oliver Purnell, a former assistant at Maryland under both Lefty Driesell and Bob Wade, is beginning his second season at the helm at ODU. A Monarch alumni, he captained their 1975 NCAA Division II title team.

The big question for the Tar Heels is the availability of point guard Derrick Phelps. The junior point guard missed UNC's last two exhibition games and was ineffective in the Blue/White scrimmage. He is listed as questionable with a bruised knee for tonight's tilt.

Should Phelps be unable to go, look for senior Henrik Rodl to start at the point, with freshman Dante Calabria seeing duty as the backup. Calabria had a team-high eight assists Saturday in the Tar Heels' 103-75 win over a team of Australian all-stars.

Senior forward George Lynch has sparked in the preseason for head coach Dean Smith. He scored 24 points against High Five America, then posted a triple-double against the Aussies with 21 points, 11 boards and 10 steals.

The Lowdown

Backcourt Even without Derrick Phelps, UNC should have the edge here. Henrik Rodl should do fine at the point, while Donald Williams will begin to try to fill Hubert Davis' shoes. Keith Jackson and Kevin Swan give Old Dominion a solid backcourt duo. Jackson has sunk 121 trifectas in the last two seasons for the Monarchs.

Frontcourt No contest. The bigger, stronger Tar Heels should dominate inside. Eric Montross and George Lynch have a distinct size advantage over freshmen Odell Hodge and Marion Mullen. Brian Reese will have to contend with Monarch forward Petey Sessoms, who starred in the NCAAs against Jamal Mashburn and Kentucky.

Depth UNC head coach Dean Smith will substitute liberally up front to get 7-footers Kevin Salvadori and Matt Wenstrom in against the smaller Monarchs. Dante Calabria, playing backup point guard, will see the most time out of North Carolina's recruiting class. ODU will look to 6-foot-9 freshman Derrick Parker to help defend inside.

Coaching UNC has Smith. Smith begins his 32nd campaign in Chapel Hill, and begins the season with a career record of 740-219. Wow. Oliver Purnell begins his second season with the Monarchs. He played for ODU in the mid-1970s and helped lead it to a Division II title. He served as an assistant at Maryland to Lefty Driesell and Bob Wade.

Intangibles The Tar Heels shouldn't need much motivation to get off to a fast start and haven't lost a home opener — ever. The last time UNC lost to open the season was in 1982-83, when Chris Mullin and St. John's beat UNC 78-74 in the Tip-Off Classic. Old Dominion obviously would love an upset. And George Bush would love his job back.

them sympathize, either openly or silently, with the Shining Path.

Many of the Shining Path's most devoted followers are one generation out of the poverty of the provinces, Degregori said.

"They are the children or the grandchildren of peasants. That is why this appeals to them," he said. "They don't belong to the world of their parents, and yet they also are not accepted by the West. They are quite insecure, quite frustrated. (The Shining Path) is able to give them that security, that place."

"The Shining Path allows the anger to flow."

But unlike other South American guerrillas, Guzman, who was Degregori's boss for a short period, is an intellectual.

"He was very professional," Degregori says of Guzman, who founded the Shining Path during the 1960s. "He dressed in a very conservative way. He would always treat you with respect."

Rhodes

Robertson, a political science major from Cary, plays deep snapper for the football team. During the summer of 1991, he interned at the U.S. Supreme Court. Robertson said studying at Oxford would give him a more philosophical view of the law.

Robertson participates in the hospital visitation program, in which members of the UNC football team visit the pediatrics floor of the UNC Hospitals. The experience has led him to write a movie script about dealing with Alzheimer's disease.

"He always addressed you as 'doctore,' or 'profesore.' That is very unusual in Peru. Once I know you, I will not address you in the formal sense, but not him."

"During those years, he was dean of the faculty," Degregori said. "He signed my check."

The movement, despite its penchant for random violence, is run by intellectuals like Guzman, Degregori said.

"I never thought (Guzman) would have been able to do what he has," Degregori said. "There is no other movement in the world, I think, where the intellectualism of the leaders comes through."

"It is very dangerous, because to the intellectual, thought is the highest form. (The movement) and the planning, the mental aspect, is kind of like a civil religion. It infects the people."

But things might be getting better. Since Guzman's Sept. 12 capture, the violence has subsided in Peru.

"This summer was very bad. There

was a great deal of violence. People were afraid to come out of their houses," Degregori said. "Now things seem better. People are calmer, more comfortable in the cities."

"No one expected Guzman to ever be captured. That restored some feeling of security."

Like many other South American countries, Peru is a nation of contrasts, Degregori said.

"There is a significant gap between Lima, the city, and the provinces, and the country," he said.

But the Shining Path's rise, and the chaos it has created within the nation's government, has hit both the cities and the provinces. Until Guzman's capture, the federal government had not been able to stop the violence or silence anti-government sentiment.

"This is not just an intellectual movement, not just a violent movement," he said.

"They will kill anybody. Indian, non-Indian. It does not matter."

from taking the time to use both sides or even grabbing a sheet out of the recycling bin."

TARP Co-chairwoman Tina Habash said she would like to see more emphasis on buying recycled items on campus, especially in the Student Stores, where so much paper is purchased.

More education is key to the success of campus recycling efforts, Habash said.

"We should try to educate more incoming freshmen about recycling," Habash said.

"Although efforts should not by any means be restricted to the freshman class, their impression would be that Carolina cares about the environment, and they will care, too."

Herzenberg added that Hunt had made a point of discussing transportation with Chapel Hill Mayor Ken Broun during his campaign.

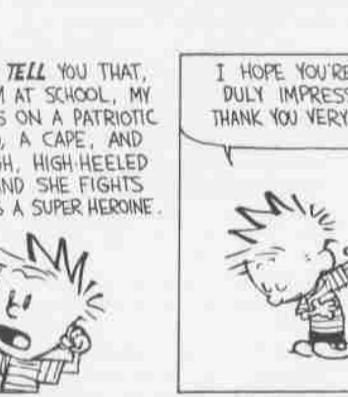
"Jon is well-qualified and would be ideal for this position," Herzenberg said.
