

American Foreign Policy Will Be Taft's Topic in Weil Lectures Here Next Month; He Will Be University's Guest at Dinner

U. S. Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, who two weeks ago declared his candidacy for the Republican nomination for President, will deliver the Weil lectures here Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, November 27, 28, and 29.

Gordon W. Blackwell, chairman of the University's committee on established lectures, announces that Senator Taft's general topic will be American Foreign Policy and that the topics for the three lectures will be:

1. Objectives of American Foreign Policy.
2. Powers of the President and Congress in Foreign Policy.
3. A Proper Foreign Policy for the United States.

It is expected that after each lecture Senator Taft will submit to questions from the audience. He is well known for his frankness in replying to questions about his views on all matters of the country's domestic and foreign policies. He has visited Chapel Hill twice before, and this quality of frankness commended him to the people who heard him on these occasions.

The University will give a dinner for Senator Taft in the evening of Wednesday, November 28.

With his visit to Chapel Hill

Senator Taft will combine a visit to Duke University. The announcement was made Monday at Duke that he would speak in the Page auditorium there at 2:30 in the afternoon of the 28th. Dante Germino, head of the student organization under whose auspices Senator Taft is coming, says that the Senator will speak for 45 minutes and will devote 15 minutes to answering questions.

Jack Lasley's Bull Brings Highest Price

A bull raised by Jack Lasley on his farm out beyond the University lake brought the highest price of any bull sold last week at the Hereford breeder's sale in Durham. The animal, named WRJ Rollo Mischief, was sold for \$785 to the Stricklin Hereford Farms of Kinston. The bull was bred by the Johnson Brothers Hereford Ranch of Jacksboro, Texas, and was bought by Mr. Lasley as a young calf.

Mr. Lasley also sold a bull calf and a bred cow at the Durham sale. The three cattle averaged \$743 a head.

The sale is one of the top events of its kind in North Carolina. The animals sold are all polled Herefords.

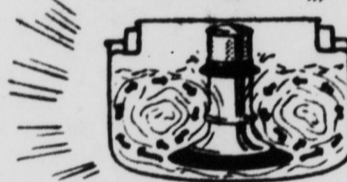

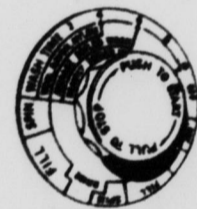
